California Taxing Docks & Other Items

This month I have 2 ½ items I want to gripe about. Yes, I am expanding the "STOP" message

In my last communique I wrote about Plan "C" which is to have the main and mid channels of Huntington Harbour annexed by Huntington Beach from the State which our State Senator Janet Nguyen has been working on along with our Mayor Mike Posey (please support both of these good individuals). I implored any and all of you, especially if you know a City Council member, to contact them and let them know they should approve the annexation. If the annexation succeeds our fees will logically drop and the money will stay here instead of going to Sacramento.

Some of you might have received a Property Value Notice from the office of assessor Claude Parrish. This is something new but has been on the books for a number of years. This assessment is called a TAXABLE POSSESSORY (a new word not in the dictionary) for Harbour Usage. It isn't enough that we have to pay for our docks as well as pay property tax on out docks, now we have to pay to use the harbor. It's only a couple of hundred dollars, but really? A friend of mine in Newport Beach got a similar notice. I wonder if this is legal, and will certainly protest to our County assessor Claude Parrish.

I call this a half because it only affects Trinidad Island but might spread. Our HOA has contracted with an engineering company to study if the rising sea will necessitate raising our walkway a foot or so to mitigate a rising sea over the next 50 to 100 years for one to two million dollars. I can assure you Al Gore's rising sea won't happen, but that hasn't stopped our HOA spending money to study this. I understand other communities in Huntington Harbour are also looking into this and might be spending foolishly to study the problem.

Scrumptious Kiwi Sorbet is Easy to Prepare. Really.

Remember when the kiwi was considered exotic? It was not that long ago that the tempting darlings were difficult to find. Beneath the deceptive, downy brown covering, a delicate, sweet-tart treasure awaits. The taste is a pleasing blend of strawberry, pineapple and sweet ripe melon.

Native to China, kiwis used to be called "Chinese gooseberries" by Westerners until New Zealand developed their commercial production and named them after their national bird.

My favorite sorbet showcases kiwi fruit. I like to serve it accompanied with crisp cookies.

Kiwi Sorbet

(Yield: makes 5 to 6 medium-large scoops)

1 cup water, 1 cup sugar, 5 standard green kiwi, juice of 1/2 lemon, garnish - 6 sprigs fresh mint.

1. Combine water and sugar in a medium saucepan. Bring to a boil over high heat, gently shaking the handle occasionally to distribute and dissolve sugar; boil for 5 minutes. Remove from heat and cool sugar syrup mixture to room temperature. 2. Peel and slice kiwi fruit and puree in food processor fitted with the metal blade. Measure 1/2 of sugar syrup mixture and add to kiwi. 3. Add lemon juice and process until blended. Process in ice cream machine according to manufacturer's directions.

Friday evening May 25th about 50 Anglers of Huntington Harbour and guests gathered at the Coral Cay waterfront home of Michael and Terri Feterick for the group's May TGIF. Each of the Anglers brought one of their favorite appetizers or desserts to be enjoyed by all as they socialized on the Feterick's waterfront patio and discussed upcoming Angler activities like the Kid's Fishing Trip for at-risk children and the AHH Member Fishing Tournament. Annual Kid's Fishing Trip

At 6:30 am the morning of May 30th 9 Anglers of Huntington Harbour were aboard the 80 foot "Freelance" at Davey's Locker in Newport Beach setting up rods and putting hooks and sinkers on lines as 55 kids and counselors from 5 Huntington Beach middle and high schools arrived. For the past 47 years the Anglers have taken at-risk children in our community on an unforgettable day of deep sea fishing. 26 years ago the Anglers partnered with Dr. Paul Morrow and the Huntington Beach Schools At-Risk Program where the Kid's Fishing Trip is used as an incentive to motivate children who are falling behind to get back on track. The trip has become a life changing event that adds joy and meaning to the lives of these at-risk children. This year's trip was coordinated by 2nd Vice President Phil Lupton who appointed Jim Armor to be in charge the day of the trip. The fishing was great and the kids caught well over a hundred fish and 105 were keepers. The fish included Sculpin, White Fish, Sole, Calico Bass, Sheep Head and Rock Fish. It was heartwarming to see the kid's faces light up with excitement as they caught

their first fish of the day and for some their first fish ever. Trophies were awarded for the 1st, 2nd and 3rd Heaviest Sack and the 1st, 2nd and 3rd Largest Fish. In addition to breakfast, lunch, snacks and the trophies each child received a picture catching a fish and their fish were cleaned by the crew to take home for dinner. This year's photographer was Bruce Bayless and Kathy Bayless printed the pictures for the kid's to take with them. In appreciation for helping the Anglers select the children to go fishing for the past 26 years a fishing reel was awarded to Dr. Paul Morrow, the retired principal of Marina High School. Anglers helping the kids bait hooks and catch fish on this year's trip included Jim Armor, Bruce Bayless, Dave Casey, Bob Hetzler, Kathy Bayless, Bob Mandic, Bill Woodard, Nick Peoples and Mike Concannon.

Sea Isle Garden Club

The Poppies have been in full bloom along Edinger since May, and you can still spot them surrounding the fuchsiacolored bougainvillea just east of Bonaire.

The Sea Isle Garden Club, supported by so many of our community members, along with the City of Huntington Beach, installed the original plantings of Matilija poppies in 2009 all along the mile stretch of Edinger to the Sunset Marina Bridge. Over 20 groups of poppies had been reduced for various reasons to just a couple of flowers two years ago. But this year they have made a comeback.

In celebration of their revival, the Sea Isle Garden Club gathered for a Picnic with the Poppies, May 21st, at the Edinger Parkway walk next to the poppies. Dorothy Ralphs and Carolyn Platt organized the event, with Cindy Allen, Mary Ann Brinket, Cathy Kelly, Sandy Atherton, Caron Mount, Lucille Mascoli, and all the way from St.George, Utah, our treasurer, Carolyn Lloyd, attending. Dorothy provided the table with colorful tablecloth, napkins, flower arrangement, cushions, and liquid refreshments. Carolyn prepared the


lunch, with croissant sandwiches, potato salad, fruit, and deviled eggs. The ants came uninvited.

Caron Mount brought some Matilija poppy seeds, which she had purchased online. They came with instructions and resources on how to germinate the seeds. Oddly, these poppy seeds germinate readily after a flash heat and/or smoke of a wild fire, like the thick smoke we had here in October after the fires in Anaheim and Orange. Within their range, they prefer gravelly soil, sometimes growing on the sides of stream banks or alongside a road, as seen on Catalina Island up Avalon Canyon to the Wrigley Botanical Garden. Catalina has had a few serious fires, and the poppies did spring back.

The instructions with the seeds explained how nurserymen/women have tried different odd techniques which they say work, such as soaking the seeds in rubbing alcohol for 15 minutes. This is to replace the fire-induced germination. Another gardener found success in using a hydrogen peroxide soak and stir, rinse in a strainer, then putting them in a plastic bag with peat moss and perlite, followed by refrigeration for two months before planting. One would wonder how this relates to a natural environment.

Our Sea Isle members discussed the various ways we could safely use the flash-fire method at our September meeting at the Seagate Clubhouse. We could plant them in a peat-pot, burn pine needles on top, then water. Or we may try to soak them in smoke-water before planting and then they are suppose to pop right up.

So at our September 12 meeting, at 10:00 at the Seagate Bonaire Clubhouse, we will be giving it a try with several techniques. You are welcome to join us. For more information, contact Bonnie Specht at (714) 625-8449.





Our meetings will resume in September but we're already planning on hitting the ground running.



Working on Your Financial Stress

Now that's a stressful topic—Financial Stress! Stress is a psychological response to a perceived threat. It can affect you with conditions such as high blood pressure, insomnia, weight gain/loss, and substance abuse, to name a few. These spending policies will curtail impulse purchases of expensive (unneeded?) items.
- 2. Have an Emergency Fund. If you need a new transmission in your car or a new air conditioning unit, dip into the Emergency

- Fund, then replenish it. Don't let the Emergency cause stress . . . you have a fund to prevent that!
- 3. Give your money a purpose. Purpose can include travel, a new car in 12 months, or helping a grandchild with college expenses. Prioritize what's most important to you in the next 12-24 months. Keeping your purpose in mind will help create positive and self-satisfying results in your spending.
- 4. Simple concepts to implement
 - Balance your cash accounts each month
 - The art of finding the deal; prudent spending
 - Stop impulse purchases (see #3 above)
 - Save money monthly (feeds into 1 and 2 above)
 - Check your credit report regularly (2-3 times per year)
 - Give charitably (fits into #1 above)
- 5. Set up a Financial Plan. This is not a 3-inch thick binder that a "professional" gives to you. It is a comprehensive plan of how save, invest, save on taxes, protect your assets, draw on investments during retirement, and pass your legacy to your loved ones. It's an action plan, not a 2-pound paper block on your shelf.

Find positive aspects of your life each day - gratitude dissolves stress. To paraphrase the Serenity Prayer:

- Grant me the serenity to accept the things I cannot change (stock market volatility)
- Courage to change the things I can (saving & spending)
- And wisdom to know the difference

Last, consider the benefits of getting outside help. Most people need an independent voice to help with decisions around money and their future. Huntington Harbour Garden Club

Our speaker in April was a resident and business owner for 40 years, Gary Hart, of Hartscape Company, a complete landscape construction company that is licensed, bonded and insured, www. hartscape.com, (714) 891-9151.

Gary stressed the importance of being an informed consumer and educated us on the basics. Foremost, is to make sure that anyone hired is licensed, bonded and insured to protect you and the workers on your property. Concrete work basics is to know the materials being used. The minimum aggregate rock size in a driveway should be 1 inch, to allow more surface area and minimize cracking, and 3/8 inch for walkways. Rebar is the best support in the middle of the concrete, not mesh. Also, do not use fly ash because it will leave dark spots. The thickness should be 4 inches and the P.S.I. 2000, at the least. Mr. Hart has a standard of 3500 P.S.I. The driveway must be poured all at once, otherwise it will have variations in color. Then the finish is either sanded or stamped. A city permit is required on any wall over three feet. It is best to have a complete plan of your yard agreed upon before any work is started. Hart works with a hand artist that is available to help visualize and design what his clients envision. We saw an example of this architects astounding drawing of a detailed landscape design.

Commercial supply houses, such as, Imperial Sprinkler Supply, are the best to buy from for quality sprinkler parts such as Rainbird, swing joints for pop-ups to prevent breakage and 20 foot sections of pipes. A local supplier of pavers, Orco Block and Hardscape (11100 Beach Blvd.) does not mandate a minimum purchase amount so will save you on little jobs.

One of the questions posed was, "How can cracks be fixed?" Answer: With the lowering of the VOC's in California: can't do it anymore with previous products. Current purported concrete coatings generally only last a few years.

Mr. Hart also introduced us to some of the products he recommends for use on our lawns and in our planters. "Green as It Gets," www.GreenAsItGets.com, are products developed by Jere White, a Biochemical Engineer graduate of Stanford, that work with the micro ecology of the soil to produce healthier plants and lawns. Gary graciously donated some bags of these products for our club.

At our festive St. Patrick's Day themed March meeting at the home of Connie

and Bob Mandic, we heard Linda Jenis, a Master Gardener with UCCE Orange County Master Gardeners and retired teacher speak on Container Vegetable Growing. She encouraged us to be creative and use different types of containers with combinations of herbs. Whether starting from seeds or purchased plants, the key to successful container growing was maintaining the proper water balance and drainage. Make sure all pots have a hole in the bottom!

Our Tuesday, May 15, meeting featured Susan Butala of the O.C. Fuchsia Society. The June 19th installation was at Kathy Mays in H.B. Central Park. We resume our meetings in September. 
