




## **HHPC: Trinidad Group**




# 'Tis the Season for (Tax-Efficient) Gifting

Looking for gift ideas for your family? Consider gifting appreciated stock to benefit both the giver and receiver.

When you are considering what type of gift for your family and friends, several options are available to you including cash, gift cards, merchandise, and more. Especially for your family, let's explore a popular gifting strategy: shares of stock that have greatly appreciated in value.

In a nutshell, this gifting strategy consists of transferring appreciated shares of stock to a lucky gift recipient who is in a lower tax bracket than the person making the gift. The recipient would receive the shares of stock, sell them, and pay little or no taxes on the capital gain (depending on his/ her marginal tax bracket). This allows the giver to make the gift without paying higher capital gains tax (which she would have to pay if she sold the stock) while passing the stock to a family member, such as her child or grandchild, who might pay no tax.

Under our current law, a single taxpayer with taxable income lower than \$38,600 (\$77,200 for Married Filing Joint taxpayers) would have a 0% Federal capital gains tax rate, whereas someone with a taxable income over \$425,800 for a single taxpayer (\$479,000 for Married Filing Joint) would have roughly a 24% Federal capital gains tax rate. The differences in tax rates provide a fantastic opportunity for gift planning! (SEE DIAGRAM)



In 2018, the Annual Gift Tax Exclusion is \$15,000 per person. This means that each person can gift up to \$15,000 to whomever they want, and that amount will never be subject to gift taxes.

Example: Alice is 61-year old widow. She wants to gift money to her 2 adult kids and their spouses. She can gift up to \$15,000 to each child and \$15,000 to each spouse, a total of \$60,000, this year without any gift tax consequences.

#### **Smart Cookies...Not Fussy or Fancy, Just Plain Delicious**

Designer cookies? Only if they're designed to be easy. My pal Tillie Clements makes these no-nonsense cookies for kids at Christmas. "No fussbudget cookies," she says, adding that she likes to forget about piping out frosting.

For the greatest success in cookie making, Land O'Lakes butter advises that butter temperature is crucial. If the butter is too soft or melted, it produces flatter cookies. They suggest that you take the butter out of the refrigerator about 20 minutes before making cookies. To test it, press butter with back of spoon. It should yield to pressure. It shouldn't be shiny and there shouldn't be any melted pools of butter, a problem some people have if trying to soften butter in the microwave.

But just-right butter isn't applicable in these easy treats. Start with cold-hard butter.

#### Tillie's Brown Sugar Shortbread Buttons

#### Yield: 2-3 dozen

Nonstick spray, 1 cup (2 sticks) cold butter (cut into about 16 pieces), 2/3 cup light brown sugar (packed), 2 cups allpurpose flour (divided use)

1. Adjust oven rack to middle position. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Line baking sheets with parchment paper.

2. Place butter pieces and brown sugar in food processor fitted with metal blade. Pulse until creamy. Add 1 cup flour



to processor; pulse to combine. Add remaining flour and pulse to combine and form ball (some bits may still be on the side). Scape down sides as needed to make sure all flour in incorporated.

3. Break off unshelled-walnut-sized pieces of dough, roll into ball and place on prepared baking sheet. Spray bottom of a flat-bottomed glass with nonstick vegetable spray. Flatten dough with bottom of glass to make round cookie a tiny bit thicker than 1/4 inch – smooth sides with fingers if needed. Using chopstick or plain tip from a pastry bag, make holes so cookie looks like button (at 12,3,6,9). Repeat to make about 1 dozen cookies on sheet. (The cookies

don't spread much during baking.)

4. Bake in preheated oven 8 to 13 minutes or until golden around edges. Remove from oven and immediately repeat punching holes with chopstick. Cool 5 minutes on baking sheet. Transfer to cooling rack. Cool completely. Presentation: Run narrow ribbon through 1 hole of 2 or 3 cookies. Tie loosely so you have a string of shortbread cookies.



## **Eyes On Nest Sites Program Wraps Up Another Successful Season**

The Eyes on Nest Sites (EONS) program was launched in 2010 by the Bolsa Chica Conservancy (BCC) in collaboration with the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW). EONS is a public education and wildlife monitoring program primarily focused on observing the nesting success of two bird species: the endangered California Least Tern (Sternula antillarum browni) and the threatened Western Snowy Plover (Charadius alexandrinus nivosus). This year marks the most successful year in the number of California Least Terns succeeding to fledgling age and the number of people reached.

The 2018 EONS survey season extended from April 15th through July 27th and was monitored by 68 volunteers that dedicated 979 hours of monitoring of these endangered birds. This year the Least Terns scraped 54 nests at the North end of Nest Site 1. The increase in nests is likely a result of all the hard work by Department of Fish and Wildlife volunteers clearing the vegetation before the season began. The Least Terns were able to lay 98 eggs in those nests which hatched into 64 chicks. The first fledgling flight was recorded on June 20th and a total of 42 fledglings were observed by the end of the season. EONS monitors had a great time monitoring the terns and watching the chicks grow more and more every week.

EONS monitors play a vital role in educating the public about these special birds and answering any questions visitors may have. It is important to get people involved in the conservation of these species of concern and to increase the awareness of our impact on their recovery. Throughout the 2018 monitoring season 2,458 visitors approached our EONS monitors. The number of visitors reached increased by 69% compared to the 1,456 reached in 2017. EONS monitors are also our eyes and ears of the reserve as well as public educators. With the growing popularity of drones we have seen a fair share on the reserve; EONS monitors reported drones 4 times throughout the season. Drones can be a problem for nesting birds as they can easily be mistaken as predators hunting and can possibly result in abandoned nests.




