



## **Youth STEM Programs at Bolsa Chica**

Conservation of natural ecosystems wouldn't be possible without the hard work and unerring dedication of scientists, as well as the support and concern of the general public. The best way to encourage the public to be invested in conservation is by educating them about its importance and the positive personal impacts their actions have. Through the Bolsa Chica Conservancy STEM-based (Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics) education programs are offered for those as young as pre-kindergarten and through to college and the general public. In 2018, the Conservancy had more than 55,000 people participate in the available education programs. Of that total 14.5% were pre-kindergarten, 16.7% were in elementary school, 17.1% were from middle school, 16.3% were in high school, 33.7% were college students and adults, and 1.7% were in scout programs.

Most of the Conservancy's education programs start at the Bolsa Chica Interpretive Center, which acts as a gateway to wetland and watershed discovery and understanding. One of the most popular programs is a guided

hike through the wetlands which is customizable for students of all grade and comprehension levels. These hikes are typically 1.5 miles long and give students the opportunity to observe the plants and animals that call the wetlands home. Trained naturalist guides provide information as to why the wetlands are important, not just to the organisms there but also us humans. Topics from wetland ecology to human history at Bolsa Chica are discussed to allow students to interpret the wetlands from multiple perspectives. In addition to the guided hike, a guided tour of the Bolsa Chica Interpretive Center is offered so students can see educational and engaging displays including saltwater aquariums, numerous bird taxidermy, and live snakes.

STEM-based labs and field activities are also available through the Bolsa Chica Conservancy, and options are available to every age group. "What's In The Mud" is a lab aimed at grades 3-12 which allows students to identify and learn about the marine invertebrates that live in Bolsa Chica. "Wetland Food Webs" (grades K-8) familiarizes students with wetland

plant and animal species and their relationships with one another while "Birds and Adaptations" (grades 3-8) has students observing the relationship between the tides and bird species that reside in Bolsa Chica. There are more advanced labs for middle school, high school, and college students that involve collecting water, soil, and plankton samples for analysis of abiotic factors and/ or observing the adaptations between native and non-native species.

While teachers are encouraged to bring their students to experience the wetlands first hand, we understand that not every class or school has the means to do so. The "Windows to Our Wetlands" (WOW) is the Conservancy's mobile wetland ecology program that allows the wetlands to come to the students. Within the WOW bus is a 100-gallon touch tank as well as two smaller saltwater aquariums with native marine animals for students to engage with and observe. Another learning opportunity is an outside station with a terrestrial animal display where students can learn about the mammals, birds, and reptiles that live in Bolsa Chica. A second outside station teaches human connectivity with nature through a wetland model that highlights certain wetland functions and the aide they provide naturally as well as a watershed model that shows how all waterways are connected to the ocean and why wetlands are important places for plants, animals, and people too.

crucial time. Our efforts pay off. Come join us to help the other children at Orangewood.



## Sea Isle Garden Club

December was a busy month for our Sea Isle Garden Club, not only with the expected holiday activities, but with the planting of 24 new Matijilla Poppy plants in your Edinger Parkway.

We celebrated our holiday luncheon on December 12th, at the Humboldt Island home of Marsha Hendler, with a menu of breast of chicken, rigatoni with red sauce, Caesar salad, and cheesecake for dessert. We followed this fine meal with our gift exchange, not hesitating to grab a scarf, a piece of jewelry, or sweater from a fellow member. But everyone went home happy, even Dorothy Ralphs' special guest, Linda Sackin, who became our newest member.

Friday, Dec. 21, Inocencio Saldivar, our local gardener, who had helped Carolyn Platt add flowers around the Donor Recognition Plaque, planted the 24 5-gallon Matijilla Poppy plants, which Adrienne DeWolfe had picked up from the Matijilla Nursery in Moorpark. Dorothy was able to get the clearance from the City to tap into their water supply so we could provide the weekly watering these plants would need during their first few months.

Caron Mount, Jackie Neil, and her husband Paul, had a grand adventure watering the poppies on Wednesday, December 26th. They met at the Bonaire clubhouse to make a plan, borrowed, with permission, a large orange cone to alert all the drivers on Edinger that our car was there and to proceed with caution. Jackie drove, while Paul and Caron walked to the first poppy plantings by the Edinger Plaque. Caron had brought a bag with extra flags to identify the new plants, and a lightweight hose and the hose valve connector. They got started, encountered a few leaks and everyone got a bit wet. First while connecting the hose connector, the pressure in the irrigation pipe sprayed them a bit and the hose started leaking!

Each poppy needed to be watered for at least a minute. The team decided that this watering project is at least a 2 person job and they immediately decided that these volunteers needed to wear boots and bring trash bags to contain the wet hose. There were 5 poppies there at Bonaire, 2 to the right of the plaque and 3 to the left.

Jackie drove her car while Caron and Paul walked to the next spot by Bimini. There were 2 poppies to the right of the sign and 3 poppies to the left of the sign. Paul and Caron got wetter and Jackie

took notes!

At the 3rd spot near the sign on Montego, there were 5 poppies to the left of the sign. Here the hose had a major malfunction and really sprung a leak. Instead of watering themselves, the "Poppy Pioneers" stopped at this spot and decided a new hose was needed. A list was made to advise future teams to bring bags or newspapers to put on the floor of the car so it doesn't get muddy and that our cars should have on hazard lights for extra protection from the traffic that speeds by the bike lane. At this Montego spot, there is a wide distance between the 3 plants on the left and 2 plants on the right, so it's necessary to bring a watering jug or can.

With a new hose in hand, Caron, Jackie and Paul met on Friday to finish up the watering of the poppies. Paul and Jackie decided to bring their 1943 JEEP this time so they didn't have to worry about getting the car floor wet and muddy. After picking up Caron they drove to Bravata where they watered 4 poppies that were located to the left of the Bravata sign.

Next stop was Trinidad and they found 5 poppies to the left of the sign. But 2 of them were too far from the hose connector and had to be watered using a watering pail. Caron climbed among the senecio plants and watered the 2 poppies on the right.

The fifth and final location to finish watering the plants was by the Montego sign and all 24 poppies should be fine! Nine other Sea Isle members signed up to water each week; Cathy Kelly, Cindy Allen, Lucille Mascoli, Mary Ann Brinket, Donna Davis, Jan Nagele, Lu Mendenhall, and Adrienne De Wolfe. Unless, of course, Mother Nature kindly does the job for us!

## **Cathy Thomas Cooks**

Salmon Rillettes...delicious on everything from crackers to cucumber slices.

Don't sweat the small stuff. Host a simple gathering the showcases assorted munchies. It's a great way to get together without much fuss. Make your homemade hors d'oeuvres look bountiful by buying the rest of the appetizers from bakeries and specialty grocers.

Store-bought delicacies might include a glorious cheese platter, augmented with a bowl of mixed olives or candied nuts, some dried figs or Champagne grapes. Or an impressive antipasto platter groaning with a selection of marinated veggies, prosciutto slices and salami.

Whether the appetizers are purchased or homemade, think about the best presentation for each and have garnishes ready to add glamour and color. Fresh herbs and edible (pesticide-free) flowers and leaves (such as citrus leaves or banana leaves), make fast, easy garnishes.

#### Salmon Rillettes, From Scratch

A spread that shows off salmon teamed with butter, herbs, capers and lemon, is

delicious atop baguette slices, crackers or cucumber slices. Start by cooking a fresh 1-pound skinless salmon fillet. Bring 3 cups water to boil in deep, 12-inch skillet on high heat. Add salmon; reduce heat and poach at bare simmer, turning once, until just cooked through, about 8 minutes. With slotted spatula, transfer salmon to bowl and cool. Flake poached salmon with fork. Add ½ pound chopped smoked salmon, 1 stick soft butter (cut into several pieces), 34 cup minced shallots, 1/3 cup chopped parsley, 2 tablespoons fresh lemon juice, 2 teaspoon Dijon mustard, 2 teaspoons capers, 2 teaspoons brandy, 2 teaspoons finely grated lemon zest, salt and pepper. Stir until well-combined. Pack into 1-quart terrine or bowl. Refrigerate, covered, at least 4 hours. Serve with bread, crackers and/or cucumber slices.


