

Assistance League chapters across the nation love to show their spirit to their community. One of the key ways is by participating in parades and other community events. Everyone loves a parade and there is nothing greater than a parade to whip up the spirit and love we feel for the children and adults we serve.

For Assistance League of Huntington Beach, the 4th of July Parade is their favorite of all events. The Huntington Beach 4th of July parade is the largest parade west of the Mississippi and is seen by over 500,000 people lined up on Pacific Coast Highway and Main Street. They have participated in the parade since 2013, have been featured on ABC and on the local Huntington Beach station - Channel 3. The feedback from the crowd is amazing as the community shows their thanks for what Assistance League does. There is no greater feeling than being recognized and cheered on by people in the crowd. Did you know that they originally participated in the parade

The 4th of July parade is the first event of the 2019-2020 fiscal year and is the perfect beginning to what will lead into our 70th anniversary year. But, it is not all about parades and other events. Assistance League shows our love for our community through the programs we manage throughout the year.

Assistance League's year goes from June 1st – May 31st. Now we can celebrate a year of giving back to our community

through our programs focused on basic needs, education and self-esteem. During the 2018 – 2019 year, our members volunteered 66,000 hours and we gave back over \$741,000 in goods and services to Huntington Beach, Fountain Valley and Westminster.

Highlights of our program successes include:

- 2,802 elementary, middle-school and high school students served by Operation School Bell® providing them the opportunity to shop for school clothes and shoes:
- 251 Links to Learning HB monetary awards to elementary and middle school teachers which allows these teachers to improve the learning experience for their students;
- 36 scholarships to nursing students;
- 46 Operation New Beginnings scholarships:
 - 10 Police Academy veteran college students
 - 16 full-time veteran college students
 - 20 single parent college students
- 18 scholarships to college-bound graduating seniors;
- financial support from DreamCatchers to 44 disabled or impaired therapeutic horseback riding students;
- grocery cards, transportation vouchers and personal items donated to 400 homebound seniors by DreamCatchers designed to help them remain independent;

- \$13,400 in grocery and other goods donated to Veterans Resource Centers at local colleges;
- 1,386 comfort bears donated to local hospitals by Operation Bear Hug;
- 120 adults and 89 children (total of 209) in crisis helped by Operation New Beginnings;
- and 78 single parents were able to have a birthday celebration for their child through an Assisteens® program called "Birthday in an Envelope".



For the past 48 years the Anglers have taken at-risk children in our community on an unforgettable day of deep sea fishing. 27 years ago, the Anglers partnered with Dr. Paul Morrow, former principal of Marina High School and the Huntington Beach Schools at-risk program where the Kids Fishing Trip is used as an incentive to motivate children who are falling behind to get back on track. The trip has become a life changing event that adds joy and meaning to the lives of these at-risk children. This year's trip was coordinated by the Anglers 2nd Vice President and Kids Fishing Trip Chair Phil Lupton. The fishing was great and the kids caught a record 374 fish including Sculpin, White Fish and Sand Dabs. It was heartwarming to see the kid's faces light up with excitement as they caught their first fish of the day and for some the first fish ever. Trophies were awarded for 1st, 2nd and 3rd Heaviest Sack and 1st, 2nd and 3rd Largest Fish. In addition to breakfast, lunch, snacks and the trophies each child received a picture catching a fish and their fish were cleaned by the crew to take home for dinner. 

Sacramento Craziness

Ok, so I changed the title again, even though for the time being this once again affects only main and mid channel Huntington Harbour waterfront property owners. Have any of you ever heard of a property tax called "Taxable Possessory Interest?" This is not a new tax. Sacramento just realized it can squeeze out a few more dollars from us, not much, but some. Taxable Possessory Interest (TPI) puts a value on anything the government owns and leases to you and then taxes you for the value of that

lease. Here in Huntington Harbour only about 250 dock owners out of the 4,500 docks in our harbor are affected because the State owns only the main and mid channels. If our city can annex these water ways we will be in a much better position and I have been urging the City Council to do so.

So far here in Huntington Harbour, property owners on the main and mid channels need to lease the water and air your dock and cantilever deck occupy. TPI suggests that this lease has value and will therefore assess your property with that value. In my case they value my lease at \$9000 which requires me to pay a separate property tax a little over one hundred dollars. Its not that much so I guess most of us won't spend a lot of time and money fighting this. Talk about double taxation, this is nothing more than using a belt and suspenders to "hold us up".

If you haven't got this new assessment yet, just wait, you will eventually get a letter from our tax assessor.

I rent a tie down space at John Wayne Airport from the county. Sure enough, once a year I get a tax assessment notice (TPI) for the value of the lease covering the 2,500 ft. of space I lease. The tax is only around \$100 a year, but what is next? This is just to alert you of what is coming next with Sacramento's insatiable thirst for money. I can't imagine what comes next, by this death of a thousand cuts.

Sacramento will eventually realize how many will leave the State (or come here) with the highest individual taxes in the nation. Yes the weather is nice, but...?

Stand Up Straight!

We have all heard this suggestion, or command as it may have been, all our lives. I credit my grandmother for influencing my career as a Physical Therapy Spine Specialist, "tall girls look terrible when they slouch." Actually we all look less attractive, bright, and confident when we slouch. An upright posture is emotionally and physically empowering. Speech is clearer and carries much better without compression in our chests, and eye contact is more natural.

In the physical realm, lung volume and heart function for breath and blood flow that efficiently exchanges oxygen and carbon dioxide is measurably improved with good posture. Our muscles function better when their alignment and leverage for balance, strength and movement allows full length contractions. There are so many physical benefits, I could go on and on, just ask me anytime!

What can you do to start to make a change if you need to? Standing with your back against a wall and your knees very slightly bent, practice stretching upright so that your buttocks and mid back both touch the wall. Your eyes should

be straight forward as your head reaches back to the wall. There should be a small gentle gap behind your low back and your neck. Both a flat back with your bottom tucked under, and a back with a big curve and your stomach pushed forward put extra strain on your spine. Practice every day for a minute or two and you will make a difference!

As this becomes easier, try straightening but not back bending your legs and bringing your arms out and back to touch the wall in a "T" shape. As you come up straighter, tightening your abdominals in your spinal core as well as the muscles around your spine creates the support you need to stay straight. Think of bringing your belly button toward your spine. This engagement of supportive muscles is essential to being able to stand and walk straight so you look as smart as you really are.

If your body feels too tight or hurts to stand upright, Get the medical help you need to make the changes for more active healthy posture.


Sea Isle Garden Club has been monitoring the 24 Matillia poppy plants which the club planted in late December. All those weeks of rain from Mother Nature kept the plants well watered, so members had only one week when the plants had to be hand watered. On May 1st we saw our first flower appear on one of the plants across from Bimini in Seagate. Since then, the established stand, east of Bonaire, has had dozens of the white frilly

blooms with their golden yellow centers showing around the bougainvillea. These are growing up to 4 or 5 feet above the ground, surrounding the bright red bougainvillea, with the pink purslane mixed framing the base of the plants. These can be seen from the walkway and street side of the Edinger Parkway.

Anne Blayden and Caron Mount did a survey of all the plants in May, with 13 of the plants showing signs of thriving.

On June 24, Caron was joined by Lucille Mascoli, Cindy Allen, and Jackie Neil to get an update. One 3-foot tall plant at Bonaire had 6 flowers, and the small plant, pictured below, across from Montego, is just about 12 inches tall, but has a large fried-egg shaped poppy.


The Trinidad and Bravata locations have plants that are not yet showing flowers, but we are still hopeful that more of these beauties will show their glory.

Grilled Spicy Buffalo Wings

My street is generally horn-free, except that day years ago when grilling guru Steven Raichlen parked out front. Not only was his big yellow bus emblazoned with his grinning, bigger-than-life image, but a five-word "commandment" beckoned drivers to join in the fun. Bold, black letters instructed them, "Honk if you love BBQ." Some were short, shy beeps. Others were block-long booming affirmations. It was summertime in California, and everyone seemed to love barbecue.

Steveb Raichlen, multi-award-winning cookbook author, had been on the road for more than four weeks when he arrived in Huntington Beach. At the time he was promoting his book, "BBQ USA."

One of the luscious things he grilled that day was his take on spicy Buffalo Wings. Here is his recipe:

Buffa-Que Wings (Yield: 32 pieces)


16 whole chicken wings (about 3 1/2 pounds) For marinade: 1/2 cup hot sauce, such as Tabasco, 1/2 cup fresh lemon juice, 1/4 cup vegetable oil, 2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce, 4 cloves garlic, minced 2 teaspoons coarse salt, 1 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper.

For mop sauce: 8 tablespoons (1 stick) salted butter, 1/2 cup hot sauce, such as Tabasco.

For grilling: 1 1/2 cups wood chips or chunks, soaked 1 hour in water to cover

For serving: celery sticks and blue cheese dressing

1. Rinse wings with cold water; pat dry with paper towels. Cut tips off and discard; cut each wing into 2 pieces through joint. 2. Prepare marinade: Whisk hot sauce, lemon juice, oil, Worcestershire sauce, garlic, salt and pepper in large nonreactive mixing bowl.



Stir in wings; cover and refrigerate 4-6 hours or overnight, turning occasionally. Prepare mop sauce: Just before setting up grill, melt butter in small saucepan over medium heat; stir in hot sauce. Set up grill for indirect grilling, arranging coals on opposite sides, leaving center areas without coals; place drip pan in center. OR, for a gas grill with 2 burners, light gas on 1 side; food will go on unlit side (on a 4-burner gas grill, light the outside

or front and rear burners and place food in center). Place drip pan under where food will go. If using charcoal, toss a handful of soaked wood chips on coals. If using gas, place soaked chips in smoker box, or make pouch with aluminum foil and use high heat until you see smoke, then reduce to medium. 3. Drain marinade off wings; discard marinade. Brush and oil grill grate. Place wings in single layer right next to one another on grate over indirect heat (over drip pan). Cover grill. Cook until skin is crisp and golden brown and meat is cooked through, 30-40 minutes. During last 10 minutes, start basting with mop sauce. Serve with blue cheese sauce and celery. Source: "BBQ USA" by Steven Raichlen.

Supporting Your Grieving Friends

In June, Leslie Rea MBA CFP® attended a master class in Chicago on "Communicating with people going through the toughest times of their lives." Below she shares three things that she learned:

1. Grief is more common than we think.

Grief is associated with death because it is the most well-known cause but in fact, grief occurs when an attachment is broken. There are six types of grieftriggering losses:

- 1. Loss of a relationship: for example, the death of a loved one or a child moving away to college.
- 2. Material loss: for example, the loss of a home.
- 3. Functional loss: temporary or permanent loss of cognitive or physical functions.
- 4. Loss of Role: for example, a CEO that retires and is no longer "the CEO."
- 5. Intrapsychic loss: represents the loss of a dream. For example, a failed business or a failed marriage.
- 6. Systematic loss: this is the loss of faith in an entire system.

In addition to the different grief-triggering losses, people mourn in two different ways. There are instrumental grievers and intuitive grievers. Instrumental grievers are more analytic and tend to take action. Intuitive grievers are more in tune with their feelings and need to tell their story over and over again to heal. We are all somewhere between these two types.

Grief is more common than we think and sometimes hard to recognize.

2. The "fog of grief" is real.

When someone is mourning, their brain gets flooded with cortisol resulting in concentration issues and difficulties remembering. The brain goes

into "survival mode." To help a mourner remember an upcoming appointment for example, encourage them to write the date and time themselves.

Remember to be patient with the mourner as she will have difficulties processing information.

3. Towards the end of my class, the grief expert said something that will stick with me forever. She said that your job is not to cheer your loved one up, but it is to be there for them and to listen to them.

During the session, we reviewed several phrases to avoid saying to someone grieving. Two of them were "at least..." and "You should be grateful that...". All mourners have things for which they are grateful and at the same time, things that make them sad. For example, I am happy that my friend is no longer suffering but sad that I won't hear her laugh anymore. When focusing on the "happy" side of the equation, the griever may feel that you are trying to minimize her pain and ultimately, she may feel misunderstood.

In summary, the three pieces of information I share with you are that grief is more common than we think, "the fog of grief" exists, and that our role is not to cheer our loved ones up when they go through the toughest times of their lives but to be supportive and to listen.
