

Why Should YOU Pre-Hab?

Fall months are here now and some among us are contemplating getting that knee or hip, even that shoulder repaired surgically. If you and your Physician have decided now is the right time to do that, Pre-Hab may need to be a part of your program. When an injury or degenerative problem with pain and limitations has been a part of your daily life for an extended period of time, you will undoubtedly have developed compensations to stay active and work around the pain and limitations. It is common in my Physical Therapy practice to see low back difficulties or opposite side tension patterns when someone has changed their walking pattern over time. Asymmetry becomes much more pronounced and in the case of hips or knees may even present as a leg length difference because of twists or compression in the pelvis and back.

Considering our bodies remarkable ability to find a way to compensate, it is very important to try and achieve as much balance as possible in the spine, pelvis and both sides of the body before surgical intervention is used to correct a problem. For example, in a total hip or

knee replacement, if the new appliance lines up perfectly with the other side, but you are still having difficulty in your low back, or pelvis, those problems may worsen. Physicians are very good at these replacements and try to consider these factors, but that is difficult to do.

Physical Therapists are excellent in body mechanics assessment and training and can help you with a thorough muscular skeletal evaluation, hands on care if needed, and a therapeutic exercise program to address your specific needs.

Because PT's are also your "best friend" after surgery to regain optimal function and strength, they know what you can expect and guide you in things you need to know and understand before pain meds are in your system. This allows for your questions about rehab to be dealt with while you and your family can get things taken care of.

If you are considering surgery, ask your Physician about a few PT treatments before the big date. If this in in your future, I wish you good healing.





Chimichurri, a Sauce and a Marinade

by Cathy Thomas

If you are one of those folks who think that cilantro tastes like soap, never mind. Turn the page.

Count me as one who loves it, so I'm a big chimichurri fan. Chimichurri, that bright-green sauce that is a staple in Argentina, is served with that country's legendary steaks. It's also a luscious accompaniment to almost anything off the grill, from chicken to lamb to vegetables.

The base is a combination of olive oil and fresh cilantro. Oregano, parsley, garlic, red-wine vinegar and a little fresh chili, also add to the mouthwatering blend. The recipe makes enough to use half as a marinade for 2 pounds of beef (skirt steak, London broil or flank steak), with enough left over to use as an accompaniment once it's grilled.

Chimichurri Ingredients (Yield: about 2 cups)

1/2 cup red wine vinegar 1 teaspoon kosher salt (more if needed)

3 large garlic cloves (minced)

1 shallot (finely chopped)

1/2 fresh jalapeno chili or red Fresno chili (seeded, finely chopped)

2 cups minced fresh cilantro

1 cup minced fresh flat-leaf parsley

1/2 cup finely chopped fresh oregano

3/4 cup extra-virgin olive oil

Instructions

- 1. Combine vinegar, salt, garlic, shallot and chili in medium bowl; allow to sit for 10 minutes.
- 2. Stir in cilantro, parsley and oregano. Using a fork, whisk in oil. Taste; adjust salt if needed. Use half as a marinade and half as a sauce. To use as a marinade with beef or lamb, put meat in a large zipper-style plastic bag and add marinade; refrigerate overnight or at least 3 hours. Discard marinade, pat meat dry and grill.

Mike Nielsen and Joan Foote arranged and catered an authentic Luau dinner


with salads, teriyaki beef and delicious Kalua pulled pork on Hawaiian rolls.





It's common knowledge these days that every time any us participates in social media (like Facebook or Instagram), whenever we buy something online, log onto an app, or view an ad on our phones or computer, that information is collected, stored, and used. Your information is valuable! The music you download gives a strong clue about your age. Living in certain census tracts hints at your racial or ethnic heritage. Everything about you is worth tracking.

The collective data about you and everyone else is processed using algorithms—a fancy term for computer programs that look for patterns in the data. A simple algorithm knows if you buy a few romance novels at Amazon, and Amazon will recommend other romance novels to you. The algorithm draws not only on your reading preference but also the best-selling books within your reading preference.

A more complex algorithm knows when you click on an article about anything to start following you around the internet and suddenly you see advertisements on your browser pages reflecting wherever you've clicked.

Algorithms play a huge role not only in helping us make decisions but in influencing those decisions, too. Some people are alarmed about the potential for misuse and they may have good reason. An Amazon artificial intelligence algorithm that was designed to screen job applicants taught itself to weed out women by looking for certain keywords on their resumes. Researchers recently found that job-finding searches are less likely to refer opportunities for high-paying positions to women. These job seekers don't match the typical profile of people already holding those jobs—mostly white men.

Algorithmic lending systems tend to charge higher interest rates to Latino and African-American borrowers, not because they can detect the color of the borrower's skin, but because of ethnic purchasing patterns. Those demographic groups have been, in the past, less likely to shop online than their white Anglo peers.

Is help on the way? A recent article in Bloomberg notes that both the U.S. House and Senate are reviewing a bill called the Algorithmic Accountability Act of 2019, which would require companies to test algorithms for bias. In the U.K., a government-commissioned group comprised of technology experts, policy makers, and lawyers is working on a report that is expected to call for a universal code of ethics for algorithmic integrity.

What can you do? Be aware! Government regulations have proved less-than-perfect governors of behavior. But new laws would at least make it hard for companies to ignore issues that arise as they subtly, quietly, invisibly influence what we see, what is recommended, and how we're treated. It's a new age reminder of caveat emptor!
