As of this writing, the Philharmonic Society of Orange County's spring boutique; "Just the Girls" will be held at Marlene Nielsen's Davenport Island home on July 17, 18 & 19. While we're all home, it's a great time to go through your closets, garage, attic and make a pile of things to donate for Attic Treasures. Donations can be brought to the Huntington Harbour Philharmonic Committee office in the Huntington Harbour Mall (but please verify first someone will be there to receive them.) We are collecting all kinds of items in good condition (just no furniture or books please) for our massive garage/parking lot/estate/rummage sale currently scheduled for June 6-7 in the mall parking lot behind Trader Joe's.

Our Grand Marshal Event celebrating the 2019 Huntington Harbour Philharmonic Boat Parade Grand Marshal Larry Gottlieb and announcing the 2020 Grand Marshal has been rescheduled to August 15. The Huntington Harbour Juniors Fashion show has been rescheduled to April 26. Both events will be at the SeaCliff Country Club.

Practice makes perfect, so the students reviewed the steps and how they work with the rhythm, depending on the particular dance.

Communication is key in any situation, so the students of HHJEP learned about the three different types. They enjoyed the exercise where they stood back to back and one person holding a picture described to the partner what was on the picture. That partner had to draw what the first partner described. The students found themselves giggling as they looked at the finished picture which did not resemble the original, while other students were amazed at how accurate theirs was. ## **Huntington Harbour Garden Club**

Members took advantage of the few sunny days to put into practice some of the rose care and pruning tips that Christine Lemus, from our local Huntington Beach Armstrong's Nursery, spoke about in January (she graciously stepped in when our scheduled speaker fell ill.) Christine emphasized proper attire for rose pruning, which is usually done between November and February. Long gloves protect your arms so you can get inside the rose bush and, with sharp shears, open up the center to fit an imaginary bowling ball. First you defoliate, then you cut back by 2/3 (trimming where the sets of leaves come out to face up and out) and cut at an angle. For miniature roses, all you need to do is step on them. Clean up the leaf litter and use a natural fungicide dormant spray. Do not feed until there is about 2 inches of new growth and use a fertilizer low in nitrogen. You can use Pot Ash or Dr. Earth on wet soil. Roses near the beach are prone to powdery mildew, so do not water at night or wet the leaves. Keep mulch away from the base, no turtlenecks, giving a 6-inch berth. Armstrong's donated several items to our club's opportunity drawing. Thank You!

"Perennials in the Garden" was the topic for February and Laurie Hill hosted. Armstrong's Christine Lemus, the

scheduled speaker, again brought a wealth of knowledge for an interactive presentation on perennials and some seed packets of wildflowers to share. The difference between an annual and a perennial is that an annual has only one season and a perennial regrows or comes back for about 2-5 cycles. Sweet Alyssum and geraniums are great year-round bloomers. In planting your garden, it's best to keep in mind the needs of our pollinators. We usually think of bees first as a primary pollinator, but butterflies, insects, birds, and animals are also beneficial pollinators in our gardens. The agave plant (tequila source) is only pollinated by bats. Possums are

beneficial pollinators for many fruit and avocado trees. When planting organize groupings of the same color plants to give a larger target for pollinators and plant herbs, such as, rue, thyme, or Lamb's Ear, amongst your vegetable gardens. There is a tropical milkweed, (different than the native California one), whose nectar becomes toxic to the Monarch Butterfly if not cut back. Utilize our local Armstrong's Nursery for any questions about what and how to create a colorful, welcoming garden. 



Since 2013, as part of yearly literacy projects, we have donated over 23,000 books to schools, Boys & Girls Clubs in Huntington Beach, Fountain Valley and Westminster, and, to our customers.

## **Tuscan Tuna and Beans**

I have the utmost respect for canned tuna. Trust me, anyone who has spent sweaty days standing over an enormous pressure canner filled with quart jars of fish, values those pristine little store-bought cans. My years married to an avid deep-sea fisherman were perfumed with thousands of pounds of fish: albacore, marlin and big-eye tuna. Canning it, well, produced a smell that could make angels weep. It scented my hair. Soured my sweetness.

I greatly appreciate those squatty cans of store-bought tuna tucked away in my pantry. Along with a couple of cans of cannellini beans, this simple Tuscan dish can be a quick entree or appetizer for unexpected company. Quality tuna makes a big difference. Look for tuna that is packed in olive oil. Most supermarkets carry at least one brand.

## Tuscan Tuna and Beans (4 main-course servings or 6 appetizer servings)

1/2 medium red onion (peeled, chopped), 2 tablespoons red-wine vinegar, 3 cups canned cannellini beans, 1/4 cup extra-virgin olive oil (partially drained), salt and freshly ground black pepper to taste, 8 to 10 ounces canned tuna



packed in olive oil, 1 tablespoon chopped Italian parsley (optional garnish: tiny red tomatoes)

- 1. Place onion and vinegar in nonreactive bowl 15 minutes. Drain onion.
- 2. Place beans in serving bowl. Add onion, olive oil, salt and pepper. Gently toss.
- 3. Break drained tuna into flakes or chunks with fork. Scatter on top of beans.

Sprinkle with parsley. If desired, garnish with tiny red tomatoes.

Note: If you use water-packed tuna in this recipe, taste the salad before serving. Add a little more olive oil, if needed.

## The Challenge of Gravity and Time

These words conjure many images and thoughts for all of us emotionally and physically. A patient recently shared that an elderly woman who stood straight and worked daily at his gym told him she was there so much because she was "fighting gravity and time." He was confident she was winning her battle. Some days we win the challenge and others we do not. We do move onward each day as right now becomes past. Beyond the philosophical discussion of time and gravity, what can we do to meet that challenge in our bodies?

Consistency of effort is the most important factor we have a chance to influence. You may have seen me use the phrase Make Time to Take Time, it is a concept we all need to embrace. That time can be moments or much more. Many well-designed studies support the role of social engagement in health and cognition. Making time to share with friends and family that enrich your life is time well spent. On a physical level, making the effort to be active, encourages better posture and mobility.

Posture to lift up the heart and lungs and raise your eyes to look forward rather than down allows the cardio-respiratory system to work more optimally. Deep breaths to expand the diaphragm into your lower belly and allow ribs and lungs to bring in more oxygen as it literally massages your inside body can make changes quickly. Bringing shoulders down and back rather than just squeezing backward allows shoulder reach outward and upward much more efficiently. Engaging our core abdominals by

thinking of drawing your bellybutton to your spine supports your back and upper body too. "Abs before Action" is a good mantra.

A simple morning movement drawn from yoga is the sun salutation that you can incorporate even in part for balance, activating your mind and body, and facilitating upright posture. As you stand, separate your feet enough to feel balanced and stable, then take a 2-3 deep breaths, bring your arms overhead and reach them upward together, then alternately reaching further. Doing this consistently is enough to make a difference. If you are comfortable, you can add the forward bend and other components also.




