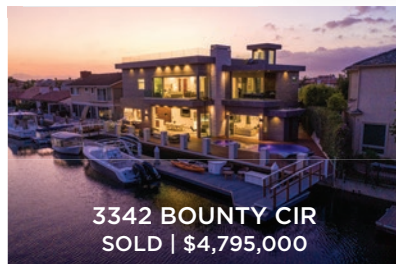

Cathy Thomas Cooks

Stir-fried noodles, with their semi-firm bite and springy personality, team deliciously with shredded cabbage. I use lo mein (egg noodles) in this recipe if I stop by an Asian market. But usually I opt to buy yakisoba, noodles found in the refrigerated deli section at my local

Alberston's. They are often shelved next to the wonton wrappers. Yakisoba noodles are packaged with packets of an oyster sauce-based mixture which I put aside for seasoning other dishes such as roasted broccoli or asparagus.



Stir-Fried Lo Mein with Cabbage, Mushrooms and Chicken

Yield: 4 servings

Salt for salting water, 3/4 pound fresh (lo mein) egg noodles or yakisoba, 1/4 cup canola oil, or vegetable oil or peanut oil (divided use), 3 1/2 cups shredded cabbage, 4 ounces sliced white mushrooms or cremini mushrooms, 2 green onions (cut on diagonal into 1 1/2-inch pieces including dark green stalks), 2 large garlic cloves, minced, 1 cup cooked diced chicken, 1 tablespoon Asian-style (roasted) sesame oil, 1 tablespoon soy sauce, 1 tablespoon rice vinegar, Dash of hot sauce, such as Sriracha or Frank's

1. In a pot of boiling salted water, cook noodles about one minute (they should be cooked al dente – tender but with a little bite), stirring to separate them; drain and place in large bowl. Toss with 1 tablespoon oil.

2. Heat 1 tablespoon oil in large wok

on high heat (until almost smoking). Add cabbage; cook, stirring frequently, until lightly browned, about 2 minutes. Remove from wok.

3. Add 1 tablespoon oil and when hot, add mushrooms, green onions and garlic; cook until browned and starting to soften, stirring frequently. Remove from wok.

4. Heat 1 tablespoon oil. When hot, add noodles and chicken: cook, stirring, until heated through. Add cabbage, mushrooms and remaining ingredients. Toss and heat through. If desired, add a smidgen of hot sauce, such as sriracha or Frank's RedHot. Taste; add salt if needed.

Sea Isle Garden Club

Even though we have all been staying away from our Sea Isle Garden Club friends we have enjoyed for so many years, we can still enjoy the remembrances of the years our Sea Isle members worked together to help the community create the Edinger Parkway. In fact our club was formed in 2003, by nine women led by Anne White and Dorothy Ralphs, assisted by chairpersons Cathy Kelly and Carolyn Platt, with their "immediate intent to clean up and landscape" the Mud Flats on the north side of Edinger. In 2005, Mary Ann Brinket and Carolyn Lloyd began sharing the role of Treasurer, and they still are today. Lolly McHardy took on programs, and a big fundraiser; Sandy Atherton added her landscape expertise as a plan was developed.

It took 4 years of discussions with the City of Huntington Beach, several projects to raise enough money from community contributions along with government agency funding to get the curb installed on the north side. Yeah, no more mud flooding Edinger every time it rained.

During this time, we had strategy support from Caron Mount, the communication skills of Susan La Pittus, while keeping our gracious spirit with the hospitality help of Lucille Mascoli. After fund-raising luau one year and a fiesta the next, and numerous meetings with the community, we were rewarded with a

ground breaking in 2007 followed by the soil fill, the watering system, and finally the plants which took 4 years to complete. The trees started so small, the flowers sparse. And look at it now.

Our club grew, new members joining found a group of very strong, intelligent, individuals focused on our project, while enjoying the meetings of educational and social programs as well. Donna Davis, Anne Blayden, Cindy Broz Allen, Maria Lockie, and Jackie Neil stepped in, contributing their special talents to the cause. Carolyn Platt took it upon herself to introduce us to all the plants in the parkway and gave us a notebook showing different plant types each month to identify ground cover, trees, succulents and flowering shrubs.

By 2009 the members were so pleased with how the community had helped, we needed to find a way to recognize those people who supported "The Edinger Project" as it became known, in special ways. Many ideas were discussed by Janet Littlejohn and Dorothy Ralphs, researched by Susan La Pittus and Mary Ann Brinket. In 2012 a Donor Recognition plaque was installed at Bonaire, and a dedication ceremony was held in the Seagate Clubhouse, attended by Councilman Keith Bohr, who had spearheaded the project with the City, and Mayor Cathy Green. Our Sea Isle Garden

Club continues to shepherd the Parkway, staying vigilant, ready to communicate with the City when issues arise.

During our stay-at-home time, local residents have appreciated the view of the trees, shrubs, flowers and succulents which are a joy to all travelers, whether by car, bike, or foot. In addition the city has really stepped up trimming trees, cutting back the wandering plants, and checking the sprinklers this year.

One of the most distinguished flowers growing on the parkway are the Matilija Poppies, those large frilly white blossoms with the golden yellow centers, like a fried egg, sunny side up, waving in the breeze. Even though in 2010 these flowers were planted at eight locations within the mile-long roadside, by 2018, only the poppies at the east of Bonaire had survived. So, in late fall of 2018 the Sea Isle members planted 24 new ones at the intersections of Bonaire, Bimini, Montego, Trinidad, and Bravata. These are wildflowers native to coastal California but are very difficult to germinate or transplant. We purchased some seeds and following several complicated techniques to plant them, did not get any seedlings to grow. At first, Marsha Hendler thought she had a sprout, but it turned out to be a weed from the soil. We then decided to purchase plants to transplant. Adrienne DeWolfe drove to Matilija Nursery in Moorpark, where the

owner had learned how to use smoke to stimulate the seeds as if they were in the area of a wildfire. That seems to germinate the seeds.

In January of 2019, our 24 small plants were carefully marked, and watered, but most of them were eaten down to the ground by some critters. Those that survived were at Bimini, Bonaire, and Montego. This year, they certainly had enough water, and we were hopeful they

would get stronger, bigger, and spread out like they have at the area east of Bonaire. But this year, the early green stalks of poppies next to the donor recognition Plaque at Bonaire were attacked by something that turned them green, yellow, brown, then black. Fortunately the green stalks kept growing behind them and we had two plants at Bonaire produce flowers this year. The small stalks at Bimini also produced flowers this year, and the one

plant on the succulent side had a flower.

You can see the beauty of these flowers in the photos that Cindy Broz Allen has taken, there is a special bond that develops when a group of people can share their talents to create a beautiful gift to our fellow residents. Sea Isle members are so proud of our Edinger Parkway, but even more pleased with the friends we have made. And we so, so miss getting together.



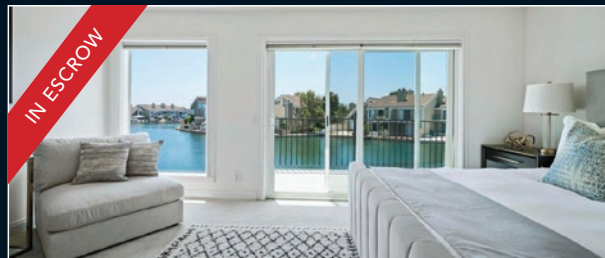

Opportunity Within a Crisis: What History Tells Us About Our Potential Future

The Second World War showed that the American industry can respond to a crisis with innovation, invention and skill. The American economy expanded at an unprecedented rate between 1941 and 1945. War World II not only ended the Great Depression, the U.S. emerged economically strengthened by wartime industrial expansion, which placed the United States at absolute and relative advantage over both its allies and

its enemies. Possessing a manufacturing and financial system that was larger and richer than any other in the world, the United States became the center of the postwar world economy.

The 1973 oil crisis began in October 1973 when Arab oil producers cut off exports to the U.S. to protest American military support for Israel in its 1973 war with Egypt and Syria. This brought soaring gas prices and long lines at filling stations, contributing to a major economic downturn in the U.S. By the end of the embargo in March 1974, the price of oil had risen nearly 400%, from \$3 per barrel to nearly \$12 globally. And U.S. prices were significantly higher. This situation created an opportunity for the United States to implement policies to produce oil domestically. Today, the United States is the world's number one producer of oil and gas, and we are on our way to achieving more than 90 percent energy self-sufficiency.

This crisis will no doubt cause many difficulties for people, but it will also create opportunities for innovation across many industries. This may be the time to transition to a brighter and stronger future!

This year, as we celebrate our 70th anniversary, we celebrate what we have done for our community up until the beginning of the pandemic and what we have been able to do during the pandemic. Even though Assistance League has lost hundreds of thousands in revenue since mid-March, we have continued to serve children and adults in Huntington Beach, Fountain Valley and Westminster.

Prior to mid-March, Assistance League had already transformed the lives of thousands of children and adults through our key community programs such as Operation School Bell® (clothing children at Target Nights), Links to Learning (awarding monetary funds to teachers), Operation New Beginnings (supporting families in crisis), Support Our Seniors, scholarships, and more.

What makes us proud is that even though our Thrift Shop has been closed since mid-March, and our spring fundraiser Treasures by the Sea® had to be canceled, we still have been able to carry out planned and unplanned support for our community.

Assistance League's community programs are focused on basic needs, education and self-esteem. Focusing on education and our desire to help students achieve their dreams, we gave out a total of \$129,000 in scholarships during the pandemic:

- Forty-nine scholarships were awarded to nursing students at Golden West College.
- Nine scholarships were awarded to veterans in full-time programs at Golden West College.

- Twenty-seven scholarships were awarded to Project Self-Sufficiency single parents.
- One special President's scholarship was awarded to a junior community volunteer who was graduating high school with honors and was accepted to Long Beach State.

An important part of education from pre-k on up through high school is literacy. Assistance League strongly believes in the value of reading as being essential to a student's success in life. We were proud to be able to donate almost 5,000 new books to elementary and middle school students. These were all new books donated to Assistance League by Barnes and Noble Fashion Island. This was the result of City National Bank's "Reading is the Way up" program. As a result of this amazing donation, we were able to help so many children who did not have the normal avenues such as school libraries to borrow books to read.

- Twenty-one hundred books were donated to Ocean View School District. These books were distributed to students at seven elementary and middle schools during Grab 'N Go meal distributions on May 21.
- Four hundred fifty books were donated to the Boys and Girls Clubs of Huntington Valley which will provide reading material for children of first responders and front-line workers attending their various locations.
- Eleven hundred books were donated to the Westminster School District.

- Sixty books were donated to students in Golden West College's CARE program for their children.
- Plans are underway to donate the remainder of the books.

Supporting our focus on basic needs and self-esteem, we touched the lives of seniors, patients in hospitals and students at Golden West College.

As part of the "Support Our Seniors" program, our DreamCatchers auxiliary donated items such as puzzles, games, gift cards and more to the Huntington Beach Senior Center for inclusion in gift bags. As a result of these donations, Senior Center Care Managers were able to assemble 50 gift bags filled with goodies to be delivered to homebound seniors.

Our Operation Bear Hug committee delivered 127 bears to hospitals in Huntington Beach and Fountain Valley. These bears provide comfort to children and adults in times of crisis.

Our Assisteens® gave \$275 in Del Taco gift cards to Golden West College students in the CARE program.

Our Assisteens provided 160 "Birthday in an Envelope" cards to Project Self-Sufficiency so that the children in the program will have a Target Gift Card when it is their birthday.

We love our community and look forward to being able to serve our community under better circumstances.
