

In the 40's, my Grandpa Tom Merrill bought properties in Belmont Shores, Long Beach and Sunset Beach. My Dad John Merrill was a Marina Developer and Dredgerman and took over the Sunset Beach property making it into a marina (where the Red Onion was/is) Incidentally, his hang out was Turk's across the street where he met my Mother and her sister on a night out.

Dad bought and sold yachts from Florida and on one trip, fell in love with Fort Lauderdale. He envisioned something like that in Sunset Beach, was commissioned by somebody to dredge island areas while he was building the marina and the next thing I know, we're moving into the 3rd house built on Gilbert Island, 16631 Peale Lane, in 1962. They were magical years, as I'm sure everyone who lives in Huntington Harbour believes no matter their year.

That first year, Mom and several friends decided to arrange a Christmas Boat Parade ala Newport Beach and it was on. The early years of Huntington Harbour were strewn with growing pains of families, and bus stops, swimming to friend's houses and rowing to "Mud Island" which is now a cove with multi million dollar homes. My Mom would yell across the bay to the Eisenhaurs, the Dods, the Badhams (brother of our Senator

Robert Badham), the Serras (exiled MD of Castro) and whoever would listen that Bloody Mary's were on the patio and there would be surfboards, sabots and swimmers in our yard immediately. It was the life.

Sue Young and I built culinary careers together. Side by side for over 20 years, from the late 70s through 2000, we taught Tasting Spoon cooking classes. Those gatherings took root in my long-ago Huntington Harbour home, with friends and neighbors supporting our efforts.

Sue was downright fearless. Not prone to "culinary stage fright," she never seemed nervous, whether we were cooking for 30 students or 300. If the oven holding a ginormous prime rib burst into flames, she made a joke while I doused the flames with baking soda. If a soufflé collapsed she renamed it using a moniker that praised its density. When equipment failed, electricity went out, or students asked if they could substitute cottage cheese for butter, she carried on. Stories flowed. Laughter erupted. Wine poured.

Sue hornswoggled this delicious salad recipe from the chef at the Tate Museum in London in the early 80s. We were conducting a tour that included cooking classes in London, Florence and Venice. Joan Cromwell's Salad - 8 servings as a first course, 4 as a main course

Salad: 1 pound green beans, 1 cup golden raisins, 1/2 cup slivered almonds (toasted), 1/4 cup sweet pickle (diced), 1 teaspoon minced lemon zest, 1 pound cooked bay shrimp, 1 head butter lettuce (washed, separated into leaves) Vinaigrette: 1/4 cup white wine vinegar, 1/2 teaspoon salt and white pepper to taste, 1 teaspoon dry ground mustard, 1 tablespoon honey, 1/2 cup vegetable oil or extra-virgin olive oil

1. Trim beans and cut into 2-inch lengths. Fill a large pan or Dutch oven 3/4 full with water; bring to boil on high heat. Add beans to boiling water. Boil until barely tender, about 8 minutes. Drain and refresh with ice water. Drain. Wrap in clean kitchen towel. Refrigerate until chilled, or up to 2 days in advance.

2. In a large bowl, whisk vinaigrette ingredients together. Add beans and remaining ingredients except lettuce; gently toss. Taste and adjust seasoning if needed. Place lettuce "cups" on plates or serving platter. Divide salad among leaves and serve.

Now that Covid-19 is on the "down swing," we at TLC hope to have our meetings and events on the "upswing."


It's been hard on all of us. We've been sending our hearts and prayers out to you. Spring is here and Summer is fast approaching.





One of the key projects that Assistance League chapters nationwide participate in annually is "ACTION! Week." In honor of AL founder Anne Banning's birthday, "ACTION! Week" participants carry out their projects in various ways.

Many focus on literacy (which coincides with Dr. Seuss's birthday), some focus on alleviating hunger and others find different ways to make an positive impact on their community.

This year was a difficult one with challenges, but also new opportunities for

the ways to accomplish "ACTION! Week" in the current COVID-19 environment.

For ALHB, this was the perfect opportunity to partner with First Christian Church of Huntington Beach; a partnership which accomplished two significant ways of making a difference in our community...a drive thru food pantry addressing various needs of the community and a book giveaway addressing literacy. FCCHB's Drive Thru Food Pantry offered a variety of fresh produce, non-perishable food, staples such as dry goods, cleaning supplies, and more.



Assistance League preloaded bags with three books each and treats for kids from pre-k to six grade. Adult books were also available for the choosing. Over sixty families participated in the drive-thru. Two hundred thirty children's books and seventy adult books were given away. For AL, preparing for this event was a labor of love taken on by our book committee who sorted, bagged and boxed the books and for our Assisteens who distributed the books as cars came through. Our Assisteens made it fun by dressing in costumes. Assistance League PALS, our men volunteers, were key to transporting the books to the church and setting up for the day.

Our Commitment to Literacy, since 2013, as part of yearly literacy projects, we have donated over 25,000 books to schools, Boys & Girls Clubs in Huntington Beach, Fountain Valley and Westminster, and, to our customers.

Throughout our 70th anniversary year, our chapter has been greatly affected by the pandemic reducing our ability to serve our customers and community program recipients as we have done pre-COVID. But, through it all we continued our focus on literacy by donating books to Ocean View School District, Boys and Girls Clubs of Huntington Valley, and other organizations.

ALHB is so proud of our commitment to literacy and thanks the organizations and individual donors who have helped us transform lives through books.

Huntington Harbour Garden Club by Doreen Hill

Floriography, the language of flowers, dates back many centuries, but the use of flowers was particularly popular during the Victorian era until WWI. The symbolism of flowers and thus their meanings, were codified so that complex thoughts and sentiments could be expressed discreetly by the giver of small nosegays or tussiemussies, as they were called, in the early nineteenth century. A renewed interest in the idea of sending not just a bouquet, but a bouquet expressing a specific sentiment using floriography, has again gained popularity.

An extensive resource to further explore is by Geraldine Adamich Laufer entitled "Tussie-Mussies, The Language of Flowers." Several photographs of examples of tussiemussies for all occasions are included. "Starting a New Garden," page 125 from "Tussie Mussies, The Language of Flowers" is the highlighted photo accompanying this article. Websites that include instructions on how to make a tussie-mussie and flower meanings, are www.hgtv.com, www. motherearthliving.com, and www. thelanguageofflowers.com.


Another use of flowers may not come to mind immediately, but some are edible. Stephen Buchmann, a University of Arizona professor of Entomology and Ecology and a fellow of the Linnean Society of London has written a book entitled The Reason For Flowers- Their History Culture, Biology, and How They Change Our Lives. One chapter explores edible flowers. A list of the 10 most common edible flowers (p. 173-4): Calendula or pot marigold, Chives (purple chive flowers), Daylily, Mint, Nasturtium, Pansy, Rose, Sage, Signet marigold, and Squash blossoms.

As we prepare our spring gardens, perhaps we can plant some of these edibles in addition to herbs, vegetables, cut flowers, and bulbs. Spring ahead and discover new meaning in the world of flowers!

In the days before social media, networking with potential customers and partners entailed in-person conversations and snail-mail. Service organizations were a 20th Century phenomenon that helped main street merchants, bankers, school administrators, medical professions, and other white-collar employees, meet together for the purpose of networking.

Rotary was the first such organization. They were chartered in Chicago on February 23, 1905. Headquartered in Detroit, Kiwanis came along January 21, 1915. Lions was founded in Evansville, Indiana on October 10, 1917. All three expected that members would network for business development purposes while they performed good works in their communities. They were men's clubs until a consent decree in 1987 that enabled women to become members.

All three service clubs came to Huntington Beach over the years. The first was Rotary, that chartered a club in 1923. Second was Lions, who celebrated their 80th anniversary in 2018. They had their first meeting in town in 1938. It was another twenty-three years before Kiwanis had a presence in Huntington Beach. The City of Huntington Beach had a population of 11,492 residents in 1960. The smell of fresh lumber for houses, apartments, elementary schools, and strip malls, was everywhere. Trucks pouring concrete for "tilt-up" industrial and warehouse structures could be seen along newly created commercially zoned streets adjoining the new and ever-growing Hughes aerospace facility in north Huntington Beach. That population would grow dramatically to 116,000 by 1970!

In the sixties, men still wore suits to work. Television was black-and-white. All residential phone equipment was leased from "Ma Bell." Home phones were often shared "party-lines." Mom might pick up her cool pink phone to make an urgent call only to find that the line was already being used by a talkative teen in a neighbor's home.

March 23, 1961 was the first official meeting of the new Kiwanis Club of Huntington Beach. Dr. Richard Kendall, a Santa Ana optometrist, was a Cal-Nev-Ha Kiwanis District Lt. Governor. He installed Denny Eichberg of Coast Realty as the President. Druggist Jim Haskell and Milton Berg were Vice Presidents. Lester "Peter" Peterson was installed as the first secretary treasurer. "Pete" Peterson was a contractor.

Clint Wright, Chief of Police, was one of the first luncheon speakers for the new club. He spoke on May 4, 1961 about controlling crime in the city. Norman Worthy spoke on May 9th. He gave a report on the state of recreation in Huntington Beach. Another program in 1961 featured Ken Moats, coach of the Huntington Beach High School Oilers. The highlight of his 10-year career was the team's 9 and 2 record when they won the league championship in 1966! Weekly luncheons still feature entertaining programs. The club welcomes prospective members to enjoy a free lunch while they experience the fellowship and energy that highlight their meetings.

The Kiwanis Club of Huntington Beach has donated many hundreds of thousands of dollars to support charities in town. Partnering with the City, they operate programs for special needs students. The long-running Egg Hunt and Family Fun Day has entertained thousands of families with children. The Club's July 4th Pancake Breakfast has been a key part of the town's annual parade since the seventies. The Visit Huntington Beach website summarizes the value that Kiwanis brings to the community. "The club has been helping kids in Huntington Beach for 60 years. They believe in making a difference in the world, in the community, and in the life of a child. Along with clubs for adults, they offer clubs for kids in elementary, middle, high school, and even in college. There is also a club that gives developmentally disabled adults the opportunity to volunteer in their community. The Kiwanis Club believes everyone can benefit from helping others!"

Member and author Mike Heywood has written a book, Kiwanis Club of Huntington Beach, 60 Years of Amazing Service 1961 to 2021, to memorialize their Diamond Anniversary. It is available of Kindle or in print on Amazon. All royalties will go to support the many worthy causes supported by the club.







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Ahoy! Cruise Industry Ready to Set Sail

Adventure is out there! And, after a year of lockdown and quarantine, most of us are more than ready to pursue it as soon as it's safe to do so. Like many of our clients, we are avid travelers and eagerly anticipate our next trip. We especially enjoy cruising for both relaxation ("sea days" are our favorite) and for sport (we climbed Mt. Fuji after our last cruise). As with everyone else, all our travel plans were put on hold last year and we are anxious to set sail – again!

Are you ready to get back on a luxury cruise or even just a short ferry jaunt to Catalina Island? A surprising number of people, like us, are answering "yes."

According to the website CruiseMarketWatch. com, post COVID-19 sailings industry-wide began last month (March 1), and the cruise industry will resume its operations at roughly 50% capacity. The site expects the ships to reach 90% capacity by the end of the year, and after that the cruise ship market is projected to get back to being chronically overbooked.

However, the experience will evolve over the year(s). Under the new Cruise Passenger Protection Act, all cruise ships will be required to have a trained physician onboard, and they must install video cameras in all public places. New air filters and purification systems are being installed in the interior cabins on several lines, including Norwegian Cruise Line, Oceania Cruises and Regent Seven Seas.

In addition, passengers will be required to undergo testing before boarding the ship and before disembarking the ship at their final destination and fill out health screening questionnaires in advance of their trip (no word on vaccination requirements, yet). Face masks will be required onboard ships in all public spaces. Restaurant tables will be more spaced out, and crew members will serve guests at buffets, instead of the usual self-serve protocol. Perhaps most importantly, for the first part of the year at least, the Center for Disease Control has mandated that cruise sailings will be limited to no longer than seven days (ouch!) Also, if you were anticipating an Alaskan cruise this summer, you'll have to put that dream on hold until 2022 when Canada has said it will allow ships to sail its waters again.

It's possible that the booking data is misleading. Many cruise lines are allowing guests who book now for a cruise departing before December 31, 2021 to cancel up to 30 days before departure and receive a 100% credit good toward sailings through December 21, 2022. Some of the capacity may shift into next year if the pandemic is not under control by the summer months. More optimistically, as the pace of vaccinations accelerates, we can anticipate more folks booking those longed-for vacations.

Donated instruments are refurbished by the Orange County Arts and Music organization, which passes them on to schools in need of instruments for their band programs. Youth music education continues to re-invent itself with new ways to play together, learn, and experience music online. The wonderful High School Orchestra Festival is scheduled to happen in a modified format on April 24th. Work is still ongoing on the virtual Music Mobile presentation, which will be featuring student musicians from the Colburn School in Los Angeles. Even after we are able to resume live interactions in schools, having the virtual program will enable us to reach more kids than ever before.

A highlight of the year for us at HHPC is presenting the reinvestment grants to local schools for their music programs. Typically, we do the check presentations in December during the Cruise of Lights[®] and hear from the school representatives attending about the music education at their school and the impact our grants have in funding their programs. The grants come from a percentage of our

We can't thank our friends and neighbors enough for continuing to support us, especially during difficult times. As you can imagine, developing new programs and just keeping the lights on has a cost. We have been busy scheduling (and rescheduling) our usual annual fundraising events and are looking at ways to safely go forward with them if restrictions on gatherings are still in place. We are hopeful we will be able to have the Score on a High Note Golf Classic for Youth Music Programs on September 20, and perhaps some other in-person activities in the fall and winter. Congratulations and thank you to all our wonderful members who through your dedication and commitment supported our fundraising activities, to our generous Donors whose gifts we received during the year, to The Rooster's and Wm. We have been so lucky to enjoy the talents of Art Dragon, the former leader of the Disneyland band playing his trombone; David Witham, who was Barbara Streisand's musical director on her last tour playing his keyboard; and guitarist, Mike Higgins who has traveled with many bands and is the guitar teacher at CSULB. All are world class musicians! Lani is not just well connected in the music industry, but we have come to see that within her very own family there are talented, and famous musicians. Her husband and their three sons are accomplished musicians. Each son chose a different wind instrument and has mastered it to the point they have toured around the world with many of the "greats". Scott plays the saxophone, Andrew plays the trombone, and Stan, like his father, Dave, plays the trumpet. Scott Martin played with the Poncho Sanchez Latin Jazz Band for over 14 years. While performing with them, the band received two nominations and won a Grammy for Best Latin Jazz Performance. They also won two Billboard Music awards. Scott has recorded with Ray Charles, Billy Preston, Sam Moore, Mongo Santamaria and many other Jazz & soul greats. Additionally, he is the saxophonist for the iconic 70's band WAR, performing and touring, playing their many hits including: 'Low Rider', 'Cisco Kid', 'Why Can't we be friends', and 'The World is a Ghetto'. He now has his own band!

Andrew Martin played in the orchestras on more than 350 major motion pictures, most notably the trombone solo on the opening credits on "Monsters. Inc.". On the Pixar film "Soul" he played the trombone solos by "Connie", the young middle school trombonist. While he played, they animated his actual movements. You also heard his trombone solos in the recent hit films "Lalaland" and "Life of Pets 1 & 2". While he was jamming, the brothers sat in a corner and listened to them play, tell jokes, laugh, sing and always have a great time.
