


















Threats to Bolsa Chica, Real and Imagined

For most of modern history, Bolsa Chica has been controversial. Many people had many plans for what they thought was best for the expanse of uplands and wetlands. There was ranching and hunting in the 1800s, oil extraction in the 1920s, and then came the plans for massive housing developments and marinas. Today, 1,400 acres of habitat are fully protected within the boundaries of the Bolsa Chica Ecological Reserve (BCER). To the local Native American community, these lands and waters are sacred homeland where their ancestors created North America's

earliest communities 9,000 years ago. Twenty-three species listed as Endangered, Threatened, or Special Concern find food and shelter and rear their young here among hundreds of other wildlife species which call BCER home.

Recently, residents of Huntington Beach received emails from a group called Save Surf City saying that the Bolsa Chica Wetlands could be developed with housing. This outright lie angered and upset those who received the emails, and worse, it offended the many people in our community who worked tirelessly

for decades to save Bolsa Chica from bulldozers. It was sent to mislead readers and attacked a measure brought by Councilman and BCLT Board Member Dan Kalmick to consider updating a 10-year-old study of the potential of the City annexing the Reserve. That measure passed, and its purpose is to update the study, not to implement annexation.

The Bolsa Chica Ecological Reserve, which contains all of Bolsa Chica's wetlands, is now fully protected, owned, and managed by state agencies. Under no circumstance will the City of Huntington Beach be able to develop housing within the Bolsa Chica Ecological Reserve. Even if annexed, the City would not be responsible for the care of the Bolsa Chica Ecological Reserve, nor would it have any jurisdiction to permit building within Reserve boundaries. The ownership, maintenance, responsibilities, liabilities, rules, and regulations of the Ecological Reserve would not be affected. As for the benefits to the City and the Reserve, that is exactly what the updated study will recalibrate.

Today, the real threats to Bolsa Chica far outweigh a nasty email. Pollution, sea-level rise, and climate change all take their toll. Urban pressures, particularly those inflicted by people who disregard the rules of the Reserve and damage sensitive habitats, kill animals and strain the resources available to keep Bolsa Chica healthy, are increasing. But, through it all the wildlife of Bolsa Chica keep flourishing. As we watch another beautiful spring migration fly in and hope that the next generation of endangered shorebirds are born and survive, we look for ways to continue to care for those creatures who rely upon the protections Bolsa Chica provides.





Capital Gains Tax on Home Sales

Your home is likely your life's biggest and proudest purchase: countless property searches, contract negotiations, inspections, and closing—to arrive at the dream of homeownership. Now, many homeowners are selling their main house with real estate prices at an all-time high.

Did you know that your home is considered a capital asset, subject to capital gains tax? If your home has appreciated in value, you could be required to pay taxes on the profit. Your capital gain—or loss—is the difference between the sales price and your basis in the property, which is what you paid for it plus certain qualifying costs. If you purchased your home for \$150,000 and you sell it for \$350,000, then your gain is \$200,000. Can you avoid taxes on that gain?

You can sell your primary residence and be exempt from capital gains taxes on the first \$250,000 of gain if you are single and \$500,000 for married filing jointly. To qualify for this special tax treatment, the home must be considered a primary residency, not an investment property or a vacation home, based on Internal Revenue Service rules. These rules state that you must have occupied the house as your primary residence for at least two of the last five years before the date of sale (also known as the "2-in-5-year rule".)

Your two years of residency don't have to be concurrent. You can live in the home for a year,

rent it out for three years, then move back in for 12 months. You can use this 2-out-of-5-year rule to exclude your profits each time you sell your main home

There are exceptions to this rule. You might be able to exclude at least a portion of your gain if you lived in your home less than 24 months, if you qualify for one of a handful of special circumstances such as a change in workplace, a health-related move, or an unforeseeable event.

For divorced taxpayers, your ex-spouse's ownership of the home and time living there can count as your own if you acquire the property in the property settlement. You can add these months to your time of ownership in order to meet the ownership and residency rules.

Taxes on capital gains, especially in California, can be substantial. Fortunately, the Internal Revenue Service provides relief to homeowners who meet certain criteria. 


