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
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


#### **HHPC:** Trinidad

It is a place that means many different things to different people. As a nature lover, photographer and educator, let me try to put in to words what it means to me.

I feel a deep connection to the land as I wander and take photographs. I appreciate the number and variety of species that thrive there. I am inspired by the natural elements and the rich history. I respect the energy that lingers from the people who inhabited the land before us. Recently, between the rains, I was alone on the Lower Pocket Trail and experienced a moment of pure gratitude. The fragrant coastal sage mixed intoxicatingly with the aromatic earthy marsh; the wind was strong, salty and cold on my face; above me the steel-grey storm clouds were subtly lit by the pale-yellow sun. I could hear the deep soft hoot of a faraway owl carried on the breeze and, as always, I felt the spirits of the past right there on the path with me. This place stirs my soul and puts all my senses into play.

As a photographer I appreciate the diversity of photo opportunities that BCW offers; truly unique landscapes, historic remnants, rugged industrial equipment, seasonal plants and flowers, wildlife, insects, reptiles, sea life and over 300 species of birds. The light just hits different there too.

Of the many highlights, so far, for the H.H. Art Association in 2023 was an excursion to the Guo Pei, Art of Couture at the Bowers Museum in Santa Ana, organized by Carrol Wolf and Rhea Black. We were very fortunate to be able to obtain a docent led tour of this very popular exhibit that will conclude on May 14th. Guo Pei is a Chinese fashion designer and the "first born-and-raised Asian designer to be invited to become a guest member of the Chambre Syndicate de la Haute Couture"(Wikipedia) Her designs are works of art, with the yellow dress worn by Rihanna at the Met Gala in 2015, taking over two years and 50,000 hours to make and weighing 55 lbs. Guo Pei's first collection was her Spring/Summer 2016 Paris Collection. She likes to select the models to match the dresses. Carmen Dell'Orefice, an American supermodel and actress, age 87 at the time, modeled the red dress at the Paris show and the dress is featured in our group's photo. It was recommended that we watch the 2018 documentary on YouTube entitled "Yellow is Forbidden" to learn more about the background of Guo Pei. Born in 1967, she grew up under Mao, with limited fashion choices. Her creativity and imagination though was not oppressed and her goal of being a fashion designer never wavered. Graduating in 1987 from Beijing Second Light Industry School, she and her husband Jack Tsao, (a textile dealer who oversees the business side of Guo's label) have Rose Design, a showroom housing her designs in Beijing, China and it employs 500 tailors, shoemakers and needle crafters.

The Assistance League of Huntington Beach, 8071 Slater Ave, Huntington Beach, was our host for our February Spring Luncheon and Fashion Show featuring fashions from the retail store and models provided by the Assistance League staff and lunch catered by Panera. The drawing for the H.H.A.A. 2023 Charity Quilt, "X Marks the Spot" was held and the winner was Kelly Bourquin. She is an active artist and photographer in our community. A private shopping tour of the treasures at the Assistance League boutique was a highlight of the

day for the 40 or so members and guests in attendance that day.

# Assistance League of Huntington Beach Thrift Shop

If you haven't had the opportunity to visit the Assistance League of Huntington Beach Thrift Shop located on Slater just off of Beach Boulevard, you're missing out! Shopportunities abound - whether you're part of a newer generation who just discovered how cool "thrifting" is, a seasoned bargain hunter, or a collector of antiques looking for a unique treasure we've got something for you! When you shop at our Thrift Shop, you're shopping to Make a Difference right here in your own community. The money earned at our shop is the main source of the income we use to fund all the philanthropic programs that help us carry out our mission of "Transforming Lives and Strengthening Community."

With grand goals, help from volunteers, and a little bit of luck, shopping days at the Assistance League's Huntington Beach shop will increase from its current two days to three days. Beginning on Tuesday, March 7, we will be open from 11 AM - 3 PM Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Saturdays.

Spurred by the enthusiasm of new and seasoned volunteers, as well as an effort to reduce the strain in the shop on Wednesdays, it is hoped that the new Tuesday shopping day will eventually prove to be the first step in getting the shop back to its original weekly schedule.

The new Tuesdays will be known as Terrific Tuesdays, but no specials or sales will be customary – unlike Wacky Wednesdays. Instead, items can be marked down when needed or offered as specials, but shoppers will have to visit the store to see if there are any surprises.

Anyone who has been in the shop on Wednesday has seen the lines out the door before opening, as well as the long lines inside. Adding Tuesdays should take some of the pressure off both shoppers and volunteers by spreading out shopping days.

Pre-Covid, the shop was open five days a week and brought in about \$1 million annually, with revenues now about half that. During the worst of Covid days the shop closed entirely, then re-opened with its current two-day schedule. Since Covid it has been more challenging for volunteers, but organizers said they see the mood brightening and enthusiasm growing. We feel now is the time to begin adding back days, and hopefully revenue so we can continue to serve our community.

Signs ups for Tuesday shifts have already begun and there hasn't been a shortage of volunteers. Of course, more are always needed. # Nesting Season 2023, How You Can Help Make it a Great One!

Spring is a big deal at Bolsa Chica! The native wildflowers are in bloom, visitors from far and wide walk the trails, and tens of thousands of shorebirds travel thousands of miles to nest within the Reserve's protected boundaries. Many of these birds are what we call "listed species," those that are listed as "endangered," "threatened," or "of special concern" either by California or the federal government. The Bolsa Chica Ecological Reserve is home to 23 such species during the year, of the more than 900 species of animals and plants that call Bolsa Chica home.

As a state Ecological Reserve, Bolsa Chica's primary focus is the care and wellbeing of these listed species. However, urban pressures strain and damage the nesting sites for these birds. Pollution, predation, and trespass are the three main threats to the critical habitats of these small birds.

#### So, how can you help?

**Pollution:** Help us lower the amount of pollution that enters the Reserve. As Harbour residents, please make sure that nothing gets deposited into the water or storm drains. Those paper napkins that blow off the patio table – they can end up in the Reserve. The plastic rings holding those soda cans together are deadly to wildlife, cut them up and put them securely in the trash. Nothing is too insignificant; it all adds up and ends up polluting the wetlands.

**Predation:** Crows, ravens, and gulls are the most lethal predators of baby shorebirds at Bolsa Chica. The predators are drawn to areas that have easy food sources, and they love a good barbecue. Keep food served outside covered so that these scavengers not only don't make off with your hot dogs and potato chips but will also be forced to go elsewhere to find food. Then there will be fewer

of these birds to contend with at Bolsa Chica. Uncovered food and food waste is a magnet for these birds, not only will the birds make a mess of it, they will come back looking for more. The birds that are raiding your patio table are also raiding the nesting sites at Bolsa Chica.

*Trespass:* The amount of bad human behavior at Bolsa Chica is shocking. State Fish and Game wardens and Huntington Beach police are giving out tickets daily to those who illegally bring dogs and bikes onto the Reserve, to those who go off trail, to those who vandalize and to those who

go into restricted areas. These are illegal because they all cause significant stress to the wildlife and serious damage to nesting sites. Please, stay on the trails when you visit, lock your bike up in the parking lot before going on the trail, and leave the pooch to snooze on the sofa.

Another awesome way to help is to become a member of the Bolsa Chica Land Trust. Your donations help fund efforts to address these stressors. Our teams pull hundreds of pounds of trash out of the Reserve every winter. Donations recently funded nesting shelters to prevent predators from reaching newly hatched baby birds and are going towards our ongoing efforts to restore and maintain nesting sites deep within the Reserve. Your donations also will pay for native plants that heal the habitats and tools that fix the trails.

We urgently need your support to help make the 2023 nesting season a success. 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
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#### Ina's Irish Guinness Brown Bread

It is hard to imagine, but I'm pretty sure that there must be a few diners who eat at Fable and Spirit restaurant in Newport Beach that don't order the Irish Guinness Brown Bread. I suspect that the Michelin inspectors enjoyed a slice or two before honoring the eatery with a Bib Gourmand award.

Served with honey butter (Irish Kerrygold butter mixed with clover honey and topped with coarse salt), it is the kind of treat that could play center stage in delicious daydreams. Cookbook maven and Food Network star Ina Garten, has a recipe that comes close in delectability. Cathy Thomas is an award-winning food writer and has authored three cookbooks: "50 Best Plants on the Planet," "Melissa's Great Book of Produce," and "Melissa's Everyday Cooking with Organic Produce." ## INA'S IRISH GUINNESS BROWN BREAD (1 Loaf, See Cook's Notes) INGREDIENTS

- (1) cup McCann's quick-cooking oats (not instant), plus extra for sprinklin
- (2 1/4) cups whole wheat flour
- (¼) cup all-purpose flour
- (½) cup dark brown sugar, lightly packed
- (2 1/4) teaspoons baking soda
- (1) teaspoon baking powder
- (2) teaspoons kosher salt
- (1) bottle Guinness extra stout beer (11 to 12 oz.) room temperature)
- (1) cup buttermilk (shaken before measuring)
- (5) tablespoons unsalted butter, melted, plus extra for brushing pan
- (1) teaspoon pure vanilla extract

For serving: honey butter (unsalted butter combined with honey to taste, topped with coarse salt).

#### **COOK'S NOTES**

Her formula calls for a 9-by-5-by-2 ½-inch loaf pan. My pan is slightly smaller, with the same depth but is only 8 ½-by-4 ½-inches. So, when I bake it, I make two, the second one in a tiny loaf pan. That puny loaf is for this baker's secret pleasure.

#### **INSTRUCTIONS**

- 1. Preheat oven to 450 degrees. In large bowl, place oats, whole wheat flour, all-purpose flour, brown sugar, baking soda, baking powder, and salt. Stir with whisk to combine. Set aside.
- 2. In separate bowl, whisk together beer, buttermilk, melted butter, and vanilla. Make a well in the center of the dry ingredients. Pour wet ingredients into the well. With your clean fingers, stir batter from middle of bowl to the outside, until it is well mixed. It will look more like cake batter then bread dough.
- 3. Brush a 9-by-5-by-2 ½-inch loaf pan with melted butter. Pour batter into pan and sprinkle top with oats. Put the bread in the oven, immediately turn the temperature down to 400 degrees and bake for 45 minutes, until a toothpick comes out clean. Turn bread out onto cooling rack and allow to cool completely. Slice and serve with honey butter. Source: adapted from Ina Garten, Food Network.


organized and sponsored every year since 1971. 2nd Vice President Steve Larippa is organizing this year's trip with Huntington Beach schools.

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# The Mental (Accounting) Games We Play

Many economic principles and models assume that we are rational decision makers. In his research on investors' irrational behavior, Richard Thaler, a Nobel prize winner for his contribution to behavioral economics, conceived the term mental accounting. Mental accounting is "the set of cognitive operations used by individuals and households to organize, evaluate, and keep track of financial activities". Below are typical examples to help further understand this concept and help you gain perspective on your financial thought process!

- 1. Tax Refund: Do you count on a refund when you file your taxes? I remember working retail in college during the holiday season and a family came to check out with a large amount of clothing. The mother inserted her credit card into the machine and whispered, "Can't wait to get my tax refund!" This woman rationalized her large credit card purchase due to the anticipated tax return. Many people would prefer to have a large tax refund than owe a small amount at the end of the year because they already have a purpose in their mind for this money. However, as financial planners, we attempt to help our clients break even on their taxes so they are not hit with a large tax liability or giving the IRS an interest-free loan.
- 2. Budgeting: Imagine an item at your local grocery store that costs \$8, but the same item is sold for \$3 at a store 20 minutes away. Would you make the longer drive? Now, imagine having to choose to purchase an expensive electronic system for \$1,100 at your local store or drive 20 minutes away to purchase the same item for \$1,095. Would you make the longer drive? Many people in experiments like this one will choose to drive the extra length for the cheaper grocery store

item but not the expensive electronic. However, both scenarios compare a \$5 savings to a 20-minute drive, and rationally speaking, your answer should be the same for both scenarios.

**3. Gifting:** Is money received as a gift different from money you earn through wages or a salary? Technically, money received has the same value no matter the source and should not change how you spend it. Yet money received as a gift is often splurged because it doesn't impact the same pain points in your mind as spending your own money. Mental accounting is also seen through gifting as a lack of attachment to the gifted item. For example, you break a water bottle that was given to you as a gift, and instead of simply fixing the bottle, you decide to throw it away. Items we buy with our own wages typically receive the greatest care and maintenance.

Each of these examples is routinely executed in our minds without conscious thought and can have a profound impact on your financial decisions and ultimately, your financial success. ## Harbour View Clubhouse Grand Re-Opening

City officials from Huntington Beach and Community Members held a Grand re-opening of Harbour View Clubhouse at 16600 Saybrook Lane on Thursday, Feb. 9. At the event, Huntington Beach Mayor Pro Tem Gracey Van Der Mark, a Harbour resident, was the emcee and announced that her six kids have enjoyed using the Clubhouse for many years.

Huntington Beach City Councilman Pat Burns said, "The Harbour View Clubhouse renovation turned out beautifully. Now the City of Huntington Beach has another building that can host wonderful events for our community. Great job by our Public Works Department and the Community and Library Services Department."

City of Huntington Beach Facility and Events Manager Chris Cole said the project began work on June 6, 2022, and final approval was issued, Feb. 1, 2023. Regarding scope of work, here are some highlights of the improvements: replacement of the existing concrete patio,

surrounding sidewalks, and ADA ramps at the parking lot, removal of old security bars and replacement of all windows, repainting of the building exterior and interior, replacement of all flooring, conversion of the existing restrooms to provide two single-use ADA restrooms, kitchen remodel including new cabinets and appliances, as well as addition of a roll-up service door and addition of badge access for City employees. The project ended up costing \$751,571.26

Jim Choate, executive director of Facilities and Transportation from Ocean View School District, said: "I think they did a very nice job updating the existing facility and keeping it a true community center. Oftentimes modernizations tend to go above and beyond the true purpose and function of the building, but I think they kept its purpose and function central in their design. Overall, tastefully done and understated, which is what taxpayers want."

Craig Schauppner, chairman of The Huntington Harbour Commission, said: "I thought the city did a great job renovating the community center and really enjoyed hearing Mayor Pro Tem Van Der Mark's remarks reminiscing about the neighborhood events held there in the past. I hope the new center brings back some of those good old times. We are going to have a Huntington Harbour Neighborhood Watch meeting there on March 15, 2023."

Lolly Mchardy, of the Huntington Harbour Philharmonic, said: "I am very excited about the new Clubhouse. It's beautiful! We do our Concert in the Park every August at the Harbour View Park. It's sponsored by Sean Stanfield at Pacific Sotheby's International Realty." Stanfield grew up near the park.

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# "Just Keep Swimming," Keep your Body Moving

Make Time to Take Time

All kinds of movement can help protect your health. If you're looking to get those protective benefits for yourself you could choose to swim, walk, bike, lift weights, dance or garden. Really, you can move any way that brings you joy and activates your muscles. If a chair or bed is your temporary base, wiggle anything you can. Progressively tighten your muscles and then relax them starting at your toes and moving up to your forehead. This type of progressive tightening and relaxation also works very

well to release tension patterns and ease into sleep. Remember our childhood song, "the hip bone is connected to...." I often think I should have spent more time learning that song than "supercalifragalisticexpealidocious". If you're not moving as much or as well as you'd like, see your physical therapist. PTs are the most qualified professionals on the planet to help you move better and allow you to stay healthy and enjoy life. From designing a program to get you started or moving more to helping you recover from an injury, your PT is the right person to look to for help.

If you are able to be more active, choose an activity that you have a chance to enjoy or develop a liking for. Avoid forcing yourself to exercise in ways that you dislike. This way you have the opportunity to create a consistency of activity. The muscles in your body only change long term in response to consistency. They change adversely in response to inactivity, decreasing tone and strength that is not consistently activated.

If an injury or problem derails your activity, get help as soon as you can.

People who get a PT early also tend to have better outcomes. A study of 150,000 insurance claims published in Health Services Research, found that those who saw a physical therapist at the first point of care had an 89 percent lower probability of receiving an opioid prescription, a 28 percent lower probability of having advanced imaging services, and a 15 percent lower probability of an emergency department visit.

High quality research consistently shows that taking advantage of direct access and getting to a physical therapist quickly leads to better outcomes in fewer visits with lower costs. Physical therapy proves that even when everything seems to be becoming more expensive, there are still bargains to be found if you know where to look.
