We are sad to announce it is once again not possible to have our Cruise of Lights® fundraiser this December. (That's the event where we sell tickets to take the public out on large boats to view decorated homes from the water.) With COVID limitations, we just don't have the ability to make it a viable fundraiser. This is devastating for our organization. We appreciate your donations and support of all our smaller fundraisers during the year to provide funds for vital youth music education programs throughout Orange County.

The 59th Annual Huntington Harbour Boat Parade, which we typically produce as a "thank you" to the Harbour residents for decorating their homes for our Cruise of Lights® fundraiser, is going forward, rain or shine, (or pandemic, oil spill, or who knows what else!? If frogs start falling from the sky, we're still having it!) on December 11 and 12, along with our Home Decorating contests. The boat parade is an entirely volunteer effort by the Huntington Harbour Philharmonic Committee and relies on private boater participation, sponsorships, and donations. The theme this year is "American Dream Rock the Harbour". Giving old instruments new life has become an unexpected hallmark project for our Seal Beach group. What began as an article in the Sun Newspaper about a donation of instruments in 2019, has led

to more donations, more articles, and to date, over 50 instruments have been donated, repaired, and are making music again in the bands and hands of students at local schools.

The latest batch of refurbished instruments were brought to Ocean View High School in October and are being put to good use. Three trumpets, a saxophone, trombone, and a wonderful Baldwin grand piano are now at home in the Ocean View High School band room.

Longtime HHPC Admiralty member Mary Busché told her daughter-inlaw Cindy Busché, and her grandson Benjamin Busché, about the Seal Beach group's project. Ben, a student and band member at Ocean View, spoke with his teacher Mr. J.P. Combs. They made a "wanted" list of instruments needed and then the amazing volunteers went to work on fulfilling it!

The history of the instruments that find their way to the schools through the volunteers is varied and often quite interesting. Many instruments have been donated by former students who related that when they were young, they received an instrument which changed their lives. They wanted other young students to have the opportunity and privilege they did.

Most of the donated instruments received by the Seal Beach group need a bit of repair. Three instruments are currently awaiting repairs and funding for those repairs. A dedicated fund has been started for anyone who would like to contribute towards the repair of instruments.

We are always in search of no-longerused instruments that may be collecting dust in your closet, attic or garage. Especially needed are large instruments that are difficult and cumbersome to cart back and forth to school, like a tuba, French horn, cello, or bass.





This year, The Huntington Harbour Philharmonic contributed over \$9,000



Cathy Thomas Cooks

In the final day between grocery shopping expeditions, my vegetable bins can be close to empty. Among two or three other long-lasting contenders, celery is one of the last holdouts. Although the crunchy

character might be the first attribute that comes to mind, celery also adds a refreshing, slightly sweet note to dishes.

If celery is not on your favorite-vegetable list, this creamy soup may change your

mind. Cooking sweetens celery while giving it a hint more of an herbaceous character. If you don't have a leek on hand, substitute the white and light green parts of 4 to 5 green onions. If you don't have fresh dill, substitute fresh basil.

Celery Soup With Dill And Croutons (Yield: 6 servings)

1 tablespoon butter, 1 tablespoon olive oil, 1 small yellow onion (chopped), 1 medium leek (white and pale green parts only - washed, chopped), 2 large shallots (chopped), 2 medium Yukon gold potatoes (peeled, coarsely chopped), 8 stalks celery (cut into 2-inch pieces, including leaves), 1/2 cup dry white wine, 4 cups low-fat chicken broth or vegetable broth, plus additional broth if needed, 1/2 cup heavy whipping cream, Salt and pepper to taste, 2 tablespoons fresh dill (coarsely chopped), garnish of seasoned croutons

1. In a Dutch oven or pot, heat butter and oil on medium-high heat. Add onion, leek and shallots. Cook, stirring frequently, until onion softens, about 5 minutes. Add potato and celery; cook 2 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add wine and boil 1 minute. Add broth and bring to boil; cover and lower heat to mediumlow. Simmer 45 to 55 minutes, or until celery is tender.

2. Puree soup in batches in a blender or food processor until very smooth (if using blender, use caution when blending hot liquids, hold top down with potholder). Return soup to pot and stir in cream, salt and pepper. If soup is too thick, add a little additional broth; stir to reheat over medium heat. Ladle soup into bowls and garnish with dill. Top soup with seasoned crotons.

Social Security is dead. Long live Social Security!

Many retirees welcomed the Social Security Administration's (SSA) recent announcement that Social Security benefits will be increased by 5.9% in 2022. The SSA relies on annual inflation data to set its cost of living increases and this is the largest increase since 1982, when inflation was still rampant from the "stagflation" economic era. To put that into perspective, Social Security's cost of living (COLA) increase has averaged 1.65% over the past decade.

The average retiree received \$1,565 in monthly Social Security benefits in 2021 and that will go up \$92 a month to \$1,657. Unfortunately, this will be nearly all the income received by 25% of seniors in America, and many more rely on these checks to pay for a large part of their retirement expenses.

How do these dire statistics reconcile with predictions that the Social Security Trust Fund (SSTF) is due to be depleted in 2033, a year earlier than previous projections? This sounds alarming, except for several caveats.

First, the projected date of depletion has been in the 2035 range for the past decade, so this shift is really nothing new—or particularly alarming. The immediate cause of the shortened timeline is, of course, the slowdown of economic activity due to Covid. The SSTF collects payments from the wages of millions of American workers and when those workers are laid off or otherwise unable to collect paychecks, the Trust Fund is unable to collect its share of those paychecks.

In its annual report, the SSA says that it is projecting employment and wages will fully recover by 2023 but that the level of worker productivity and U.S. Gross Domestic Product will be permanently lowered by 1%. That permanent decline is not a consensus opinion among economists and should be viewed with caution. In addition, the report projects that there will be higher mortality for persons aged 15 and older through 2023—meaning, once again, fewer workers earning paychecks. However, Covid mortality figures are much lower for working individuals and much higher for the people who would be collecting benefits, and there is no provision in the report accounting for the death of more than 200,000 Americans who were collecting Social Security checks.

In fact, the report notes that the Trust Fund's reserves, at \$2.9 trillion, were actually \$11 billion higher this year than they had been the previous year, and the pool of funds dedicated to retirement income increased by \$7.4 billion. The gloomy projection reported in the press is based on "less revenue anticipated in the near term," referring to those projections of permanently lower economic activity and the Covid-related deaths of many more workers.

Of course, most people, including reporters, don't understand how the Trust Fund actually works. The Social Security system collects its revenues from worker paychecks (and employer matches) and then turns around and pays that money out to Social Security beneficiaries. The Trust Fund currently, as mentioned, has \$2.9 trillion in assets—much of it in government securities. That pool of money pays out any annual shortfall between the amounts collected and the benefits—and the fact that it increased this past year suggests that it didn't have to reach into its pocket, at all, for the past 12 months.

If and when the Trust Fund does run out of money, the SSA would simply pay out the monies collected without a supplement from the Fund—and if nothing is done by 2033, that is projected to be 78% of the benefits paid out today—remembering, of course, that it was enough to pay out 100% in the past year. The important thing to note is that 78% is not zero; it's more than three-quarters of the expected benefits. And of course, this is based on a lot of negative assumptions all coming to fruition.

Finally, does anybody really think that Congress would allow the cohort of voters currently receiving Social Security benefits to take a sudden 22% haircut in that portion of their retirement income? Over 69 million people currently receive benefits and you could guess that many of them are motivated voters. Expect some age/benefit tweaks and some higher payroll taxes, long before you see any reductions in the Social Security income received by older Americans. Long live Social Security!






