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

Rob's bluefin weighed 215 pounds and the catch was made on IGFA conforming 30 pound line class dacron line. Rob, a long time member of both the HRRC and the Avalon Tuna Club, has a beautiful 40' Cabo, Magellan, that he often fishes all around the Southern California bight. Rob had entered Magellan in the Tuna Club's annual Tuna Derby along with two close friends, Don Butts and Jeff Tom. After a long trip around the outer Tanner and Cortez banks, Rob and crew finally found the big tuna they were hunting underneath San Clemente Island. While Rob is usually driving the boat for his friends to catch fish, this time Don and

Jeff said "it's your turn." Using a fishing kite/balloon rig, a dead flying fish bait was positioned in the middle of a school of breaking bluefin with a bite coming almost immediately. After a nearly 2 1/2 hour battle, great boat driving by Don allowed Rob to position the tuna for Jeff to make a heroic gaff shot. After a weigh-in at the historic green pier in Avalon, a stunned Rob and crew realized that the catch was not only a new club record for the HRRC and Tuna Club, but it was also a new IGFA world record as well. Congrats Rob, Don and Jeff on a spectacular catch.


along the walkway side. There are some blooms there, though not easily visible from the street.



Our La Casa President, Tim Branoff, reports that the Orangewood board met in person last month.



Oh boy, the tomatoes are just about to kick in. Space is limited in my yard, so when I plant my yearly tomato crop, I think about flavor, color and yield. I used to plant a rainbow of both large heirlooms and cherry tomatoes, but as I've aged, tomato greed has taken hold. I love the mountains of goodness that cherry tomatoes produce, hundreds of delicious, petite orbs.

I plant yellow Sun Golds and fireengine red Sweet 100's; this year, indigo

You can use any variety of full-flavored, ripe tomatoes in this Tomato Salad with Mangoes and Blue Cheese. Cherry tomatoes work beautifully, as do wedges of larger tomatoes – or a combination of both. This salad shows off their irresistible side by combining them with sweet-tart mangoes and torn fresh basil. Blue cheese adds a just-right salty element that balances the dish to perfection.

Tomato Salad With Mangos And Blue Cheese (Yield: 8 generous servings)

Dressing: 1/2 cup extra-virgin olive oil, 1/2 cup crumbled blue cheese, 3 tablespoons balsamic vinegar, 1 teaspoon cider vinegar, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 large shallot, minced

Salad: 2 to 3 cups mixed baby greens, 4 heirloom tomatoes, sliced or cut into large wedges or 3 to 4 cups of small cherry tomatoes (halved), 3 mangos peeled and diced, 10 large, fresh basil leaves, torn into pieces, plus 1 sprig basil for garnish

Optional garnish: 1/2 cup mixed microgreens (tiny, immature greens)

1. In a 4-cup measuring cup with a handle or in a small bowl, combine oil and blue cheese. Using tines of fork, press some of the cheese against side of container to mash it into the oil. Stir in vinegars, salt and shallot. Set aside.

2. Line platter or individual shallow bowls with baby greens. Top and tomatoes. Add diced mangoes, placing some on top of tomatoes and some along the edges. Top with basil. Stir dressing and spoon over tomatoes and mangoes. Any leftover dressing can be refrigerated and used for another salad, either with assorted greens or sliced fruit (such as apples or tangerines) atop mixed lettuces. Huntington Harbour Garden Club

One of our members, Pam Smart, has been lucky enough to watch a pair of hummingbirds build their tiny, intricate nest and raise their babies on her patio. Pictured are the two babies ready to fly the nest. Many of you have hummingbird feeders and enjoy watching these birds. It is important to change the nectar every two or three days in hot weather and at least once a week in milder weather with a simple mixture of white cane sugar (avoid organic or brown sugar, as it may contain molasses which has iron and is toxic to these birds) and water in a 1:4 ratio, as spoiled nectar can be toxic. No red dye necessary either. See homesteadandchill. com for more information.

In addition to the nectar in feeders, hummingbirds consume about half their body weight in bugs and nectar, feeding every 10-15 minutes and visiting 1,000-2,000 flowers throughout the day. They eat a variety of bugs, including beetles, ants, aphids, gnats, mosquitoes, and wasps, so let's encourage the health of hummingbirds and be careful of their tiny nests this time of year.

We have an unusual resource for our Springtime garden planting right here in Huntington Beach, The Seed Library at the Huntington Beach Central Library. Longtime HHGC member, Barbara Simone's daughter and granddaughter are two of the volunteers that manage and maintain this unique service. In May, some of you may have seen the article published by "The Daily Pilot" about The Seed Library. Patrons can check out up to 4 packets a month and are encouraged, but not required, to save and donate seeds as well. Recently, while searching for environmentally friendly products to use in the garden, I ran across an article on lifehacker.com that talked about ways that vinegar can be used in the garden entitled, "10 Ways You Should Be Using Vinegar in Your Garden". The most intriguing use was soaking seeds by covering seeds in a small bowl with water and adding one to three tablespoons of vinegar; leaving them to soak 8-12 hours, but no longer than 24 hours. The acidity of the vinegar helps to germinate the seeds, similar to the way ingested seeds pass through an animal's stomach acid. Another use is taking old rags and soaking them in vinegar and placing them around the perimeter of the garden to ward off animals, such as rabbits, deer and raccoons. Even snakes don't like the smell of vinegar. Your acidloving plants, such as azaleas, hydrangeas and gardenias, will benefit from a mixture of one cup of vinegar to one cup of water. Lastly, you can mix an anti-fungal spray for mildew or mold with three tablespoons of apple cider vinegar to one gallon of water or a spray of pure vinegar on the leaves only of unwanted weeds.

Enjoy the health benefits of gardening and check out some seeds for your vegetable or flower gardens from the H.B. Seed Library. Our club continues to meet virtually via Zoom the third Tuesday of each month through June, resuming in-person hopefully in September. 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Three Lessons in Investing...Reaffirmed!

Humanity has experienced a great deal over the past eighteen months which has led to a major shift in our world view in nearly every sense. And while so much has changed in the way we think, live, and interact, perhaps much of who we are stayed the same. Over the same period, if you had simply invested in a fund that tracked the S&P 500, you would have gained over 14%. Simply put, focusing on the time horizon of your goals and choosing funds that match your risk tolerance has historically garnered results...with much less drama!

The patient investor always prevails. We have all seen the driver who constantly shifts to the lane that is moving quicker in bumper-to-bumper traffic, only to then find themselves at a standstill; investors that try to time the peaks and valleys of the market tend to face a similar fate. Market timers have the intensely difficult job of needing to be right twice; they need to know when to get out at the very top, and when to get back in at the very bottom. By the end of March 2020, the S&P 500 was down almost 20% for the year. Rafts for Rails

Kek-kek-kek! If you're lucky you may have heard this unusual call while walking near a salt marsh such as the Bolsa Chica Ecological Reserve. Living in these salt marsh habitats is the federally endangered Ridgway's Rail (Rallus obsoletus), a roughly chicken-sized wading bird with feathers of warm brown, dark brown, and white. The Ridgway's Rail primarily inhabits salt marshes with plenty of cordgrass or other tall vegetation, a rare habitat in southern California. Rails are considered poor fliers, so the presence of tall vegetation is crucial to their success because it allows them to take shelter from potential predators during high tide. Without a place to hide during high tide, the Ridgway's Rail is an easy target for birds of prey, coyotes, and feral cats. Because of major habitat loss, populations of this species are, unfortunately, dwindling.

To combat the decline of this species, various organizations across California have constructed and installed artificial nesting rafts to provide the Ridgway's Rail a safe place to shelter and nest during high tide. Just this March, the Bolsa Chica Conservancy, in partnership with the California Department of Fish and Wildlife, installed five nesting rafts on the Bolsa Chica Ecological Reserve. Since their installation, Ridgway's Rails have already been observed in three out of five of the nesting platforms! All of this was made possible with the help of rail expert and Natural Resource Director of the Orange County Water District Dick Zembal, Bolsa Chica Ecological Reserve Manager Melissa Loebl, and volunteers from the Huntington Beach Rotary Club. With any luck, the rafts will prove a success and aid in assisting the populations of this endangered species on the Bolsa Chica Ecological Reserve.

This year, as we continue to celebrate 70 years of service, we also celebrate our amazing volunteers. April was National Volunteer Month and although we honor all our volunteers, we want to honor our thrift shop volunteers who have managed to work through so many issues related to the pandemic.

Key to our success and ability to support our community is our thrift shop. The thrift shop is our main source of revenue allowing us to normally give back over \$1million to children and adults in Huntington Beach, Fountain Valley and Westminster.

Since the pandemic hit a year ago, our ability to support our community was immediately impacted. Not only did we have to cancel our spring fundraiser Treasures by the Sea[®], but we had to close our thrift shop. Closing the thrift shop meant our key revenue source was shuttered forcing us to pivote into a whole new world of doing business and supporting our community.

So...how did we weave in and out of the many restrictions of COVID-19?

Our amazing Thrift Shop manager Susan Bjork, a Huntington Harbour resident, and members of her team immediately took charge and made sure all aspects were evaluated as to what would be needed to keep Assistance League Thrift Shop a viable player in our resource development world. Here is what Susan and her team had to consider:

Challenges – The unknowns and sorting out the facts. The pandemic was a new challenge to the CDC, State and local health departments. They were uncertain what to do. The information provided the public was ever changing. Depending on the source, some of the information was more fear based than fact based. Sometimes there were difference of opinions and conflicting information. Finding the most current, fact-based information took time and effort.

Predicting the future and developing a plan. The team's focus was trying to understand what was happening and the most reasonable predictions for the future. That was the guide as a plans were developed and altered to keep our members and customers safe and healthy while working or shopping in the thrift shop. Susan not only needed to find information, but also needed to make sure there was continual honest, respectful, positive communication to our members and our customers. It was important to let members to know they were valued, wanted and needed. It was also important to let members and customers know a priority was their health, safety and wellbeing. It was important to develop trust so members would come back to work and be willing to try things that were a little different; be flexible.

Keys to Success - What kept Susan and her team going through such a difficult year? Persistence, positive attitude, flexibility, adaptability, and trust in our members. Once again, member volunteers proved that we can overcome adversity and achieve success when we work cooperatively together. Faith and persistent support from family, friends, and the community kept the team moving from one hurdle to another.

On April 7th, our Thrift Shop re-opened happy customers two days a week with the hope of being open more days as the city moves to safer zones.

We so appreciate all of our volunteers as well as our community. We thank our fabulous Assistance League Thrift Shop team - many of whom live in Huntington Harbour. Over sixty-five thrift shop volunteers make up the team and have all played a role in the successful reopening of our Thrift Shop.

What have we accomplished this past year?

Last year, COVID-19 severely impacted many seniors from all walks of life, and the demand for assistance rose significantly. Although the doors of the Senior Center were closed to the public for over one year, there was considerable activity behind them as the staff handled the urgent needs of the growing number of local vulnerable seniors. Care Managers were very busy handling concerns associated with nutrition and necessary supplies (face masks, gloves, and antibacterial products) and made daily touchbase calls to seniors isolating at home. Transportation service requests via "Surf City Seniors On The Go" were prioritized for ongoing medical care appointments such as dialysis and cancer treatments, doctors' appointments, and grocery shopping needs.

In addition, Meals on Wheels OC continued to provide nutrition for hundreds of seniors weekly in a speedy and safe drive-by process in the Senior Center's parking lot. In a single month alone (April 2020), Meals On Wheels OC provided approximately 50,000 frozen meals throughout their 26 sites! The HBCOA helped to sponsor much needed recreational activities that were provided during this time. Twice-monthly "Senior Center in a Box" kits were distributed via a special drive-through; this continued through 2021. Over 4,500 of these activity kits have been given out. Two outdoor drive-in concerts allowed over 300 people to enjoy live music in a safe environment. A drive-through Resource Fair with a variety of vendors offered information on health and wellness while seniors remained safely in their vehicles, and a special holiday event (with refreshments, photo booth and activity kits of small Christmas trees, New Year's Eve hats, etc.) closed out the year. Finally, beginning in January 2021, over 3,000 seniors who faced barriers getting a COVID-19 vaccination due to technology issues (lack of phone and/or computer), language or lack of transportation, were helped with booking a vaccination appointment!

HBCOA's many revenue generating activities had been cancelled last year out of necessity with the temporary closure of the Senior Center. What Spells Relief for Low Back Pain

If you've ever suffered from a bout of low back pain, then you know that finding relief is often your main goal. With low back pain sending 2.5 million Americans to hospital emergency rooms every year, that's a lot of people seeking treatment options to relieve the pain. Medicationsor combinations of medications—are often the standard of care for low back pain, particularly in the emergency department setting. But according to recent research, including an Annals of Emergency Medicine study, certain commonly prescribed combinations of drugs proved no more effective in alleviating pain than non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drugs alone or no medications at all. Besides proving relatively ineffective in managing back pain, some commonly prescribed medications come with a long list of side effects from drowsiness to nausea for many patients. What about surgery? As it turns out, researchers have found that some surgical procedures for back pain are no more effective than sham procedures (used as a scientific control in clinical studies, these faked surgical procedures omit the step thought to be therapeutically necessary). In fact, a study that was published in the journal


"Pain Medicine" revealed comparable long-term outcomes regardless of whether patients were assigned to the procedure or sham procedure cohort. (Thanks to APTA for data.)

Luckily, patients are beginning to see the benefits of pursuing safe alternatives to medications and surgery. A physical therapy regimen for low back pain is designed to reduce soft tissue pain, improve function and build muscle strength. PTs design programs for low back pain that involve general conditioning, lower extremity strengthening exercises and postural education.

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
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
